"What a book! Vast and wide as the world, rooted in the abysses of creation and towering up behind the blue secrets of heaven. Sunrise and sunset, promise and fulfillment, birth and death, the whole drama of humanity all in this book." Heinrich Hein

Now, let us hear from Daniel Webster.

"From the time that at my mother's feet or my father's knee, I learned to lisp verses from the sacred writings, they have been my daily study and vigilant contemplation. If we abide by the principles taught in the Bible, our country will go on prospering and to prosper, but if we and our posterity neglect its instruction and authority, no man can tell how sudden a catastrophe may overwhelm us and bury our glory in profound obscurity." Thank you, Patsy, for your help. Now, there you have it friends; a few statements made by other men of other days gone by concerning the Bible and its teachings.

Now Jesus asked the question once: "Whom do men say that I the Son of Man am?" See Matthew 16:13. When he received the answer he then put the direct question to them in verse 15: "But whom say ye that I am?" This called for a more positive answer and a personal testimony from his disciples.

Even so, let me ask you your opinion and use of this sacred volume of Holy writing. Scarcely a home within the sound of my voice is without this book which outsells all other books in the world. Is it merely for an ornament or a custom? Or is it just to be used for some ceremony such as a wedding or a funeral, orr perhaps when one is taking the oath of public office?

Yes, all of these occasions and many others certainly justify and warrant the use of the Bible, but its use should not stop here! Notice this scripture in Matthew 13:44. "Again, the Kingdom of heaven is like unto treasure hid in a field; the which when a man hath found, he hideth, and for joy thereof goeth and selleth all that he hath, and buyeth that field."

Here we have the illustration of the man who found the hidden treasure in a field. Because of the great value of this treasure, he was not only willing to give his all for it, but did proceed to sell all that he had in order to buy the field containing the hidden treasure.

The man knew what he was doing when he had a title to the field. No doubt, he searched every part of it to find the treasure that was hidden there. This parable illustrates the value of the heavenly treasure and the effort which sould be made to secure it.

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I know a man personally who told me the following incident which happened when he was a young man about 1920.

He had been working for a man who was very wealthy and owned a farm and considerable property. In short, he was just plain rich. This friend of mine had worked for him long enough to gain the confidence of the wealthy farmer in the state of Nebraska.

The time came when the rich man decided to sell his property at this place and move to the state of Iowa in the city of Council Bluffs. Here he had an elaborate house awaiting him of much luxury and such expensive material that even the door knobs were of cut glass.

Some of his furnishings which he owned he was willing to ship by rail when he moved, but there was one item which required special attention and this he was unwilling to trust to the railroads. It was his treasure box. This was a box about 20" \times 8" \times 8". It was of steel and had a lock and the value or the contents were unknown to my friend, but here is the bargain he made for the young man to handle this box for him.

He offered to pay his fare on the train and all expenses if he would promise to hold this box in his hands or on his knees without removing his hands all the way from Nebraska to Council Bluffs, Iowa, and until he had reached and delivered it safely to his new home there.

This my friend finally agreed to do, but he was filled with much misgivings and fear as he boarded the train and all the while as he felt the eyes of the fellow passengers were upon him as he sat there with this metal box upon his knees and his hands upon it all the way to Council Bluffs.

Indeed, he said it was a relief when he finally reached his destination and safely delivered this wealthy man's treasures to his new home. Until this day, he does not know the value or the contents of this treasure chest!

Even so, my friends, let us not only carry the Bible under our arms on special occasions, but let us search its contents deligently and find and enjoy its benefits, both now and hereafter. Let us pause for a few moments with the Master.
