And by all means, let us do whatever we can for the cause of Christ even in the midst of the turmoil and strife of this present day. May we not wait for a "more convenient season"!

Now I have an announcement for those of you living in Southern Kansas. On Easter Sunday, April 18, we plan to be in service at the chapel of the Church of God on South Franklin Street in Anthony, Kansas. Why don't you come out and be with us? And if you cannot make it on this day, romember that I have regular appointments each month at Anthony, Kansas. This is the first and third Sundays. So plan to be with us another time. We are looking for a number of the saints from around Enid, Oklahoma to be with us on Easter Sunday too!

Now, look, there may be some who would take exception to my use of the word "saint" in this manner. Someone may say, "I thought all the saints were dead and in heaven!" or, "I didn't know one could become a saint while living, I thought it was only after they were dead and others then decided that they were worthy to bear such a royal name!"

Now, friends, where did you get that impression? Certainly not from the Bible, for the scriptures are filled with verses containing this word "saint" from the Old Testament to Revelations.

Now look at this verse in Psalms 16:3. "But to the saints that are in the earth, and to the excellent, in whom is all my delight."

Then how about this verse in Psalms 116:15? "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints."

Now there are many, many other verses which use this word "saint"! They speak directly of people here in this world who are in natural bedies just like other people. The difference is that they have been redeemed from their sins and have the victory over them while living in a fleshly body. Then some day they will leave the earthly body to dwell in the presence of the Lord forever according to the scriptures. Look what Faul said in Philippians 1:23. "For I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better."

So let us learn to think and speak and act in terms expressed in the scriptures.

Now for our principal thought for this time I would like to consider this verse found in Psalms 119:130. "The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple."

This is a wonderful thought expressed here about the word of God. We understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God. The laws of the universe came into existence through his words. Things which we behold with our natural eyes were not brought about by a group of scientists and college graduates using slide rules and telescopes for we are told in Genesis 1:1 that "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth."

The next verse says: "And the earth was without form, and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep." In verse 3 we read: "And God said Let there be light: and there was light."

So we see then that "The entrance of thy words giveth light." Just as at the beginning of the world it was the word of God which brought light, so it is today. It is the entrance of His words which brings light.

His word if accepted wholly and without reserve is capable of solving the complicated and intricate problems of our day including the moral issues which are so important for growing teen-agers.

There have been many other dark days since this beginning when the word of God brought light. And especially at this Easter season do our minds go back to that one dark day of the crucifixion of our Savior.

"Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land unto the ninth hour." See Matthew 27:45.

Indeed it was one of the darkest days the world has ever known for here the sun refused to shed its light even at the noonday upon so vile a scene as this.

But here this natural darkness is only a symbol of the depths of spiritual darkness which shrouded the hearts of those who found themselves bound by its clutches. It was a dark day for Peter when he denied the Lord. It was a dark day for Pilate's wife who suffered many things in a dream because of Christ. The darkness fell like a smothering blanket upon the Jews when they cried out: "His blood be upon us, and on our children". See Matthew 27:25. The darkness became unbearable for Judas who sold his Lord for thirty pieces of silver, and he went out and hanged himself.

Indeed darkness seemed to prevail throughout the land from the disciples to the rulers and no one quite knew where to go or what to expect next! So to be sure that matters would not become worse, a guard of soldiers were authorized to guard the tomb!

But as the expression is so often made that the darkest of the night is just before the dawn, so we find that Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were the first to know of the splendor of the resurrection.

Hear the words of the angel to the women in Matthew 28:6. "He is not here: for he is risen, as he said."

The children of God are serving a risen Christ, one who is alive forevermore. Remember the text: "The entrance of thy words giveth light."

Listen to the words from the pen of B. E. Warren:

He is rison said the angel to the women, when they came to see him sleeping in the cave; Jesus burst the mighty bars of death asunder, And arose to reign triumphant from the grave.

He is risen, surely death is now abolished: Grave, where is thy victory? death, where is thy sting? Jesus flashes light into the darkened valley, Swell the mighty chorus, men and angels sing.

He is risen, let the nations hear the music, Let the gospel truth reach every distant plain; Let the tidings roll, that every guilty captive May be fully free, and help to praise his name.

He is risen, hence, the fear of that grim monster Is forever banished to the shades of night; And the grave and death have lost their wretched terror While we live on earth or take our upward flight.
