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"LIFT UP YOUR EYES, AND LOOK ON THE FIELDS; FOR THEY ARE WHITE ALREADY TO HARVEST." — JOHN 4:35

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. . . Greetings once again to all the listeners of this great radio station XEG. This is THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast of Guthrie, Oklahoma and your speaker is Willie Murphey. We are certainly glad to be coming to you again by means of radio on this first day of April in 1966. But let me assure you each and every one that the things which we have to speak to you do not make up an "April Fool's" message. We'll leave this "fooling" and playing for others to do, but we have more important things to discuss with you than to waste your time in such a manner.

First, let me say we are indeed happy to hear from those who either hear the broadcast on this station or from those who receive the printed copies whether they live in the East or West or North or South. And, of course, this not only includes those who live within the United States, but we are mailing a number into foreign countries and we are indeed happy to hear from these whatever the place may be where you live. Write us a letter and let me assure you that you may expect a personal reply from us within a few days.

And now to our scripture reading in Matthew, chapter 7 and beginning at verse 1.

## "JUDGE NOT, THAT YE BE NOT JUDGED

For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged; and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again. And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and behold, a beam is in thine own eye? Thou hypocrite, first cast out the beam out of thine own eye, and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye."

Now I believe if we go back and carefully look at some of the thoughts expressed in these verses, it will help us to have, not only a better relationship with God, but also a better relationship with those who live about us.

It is easy for us to look at others and to see their faults. We can see where they have failed to measure to God's standard and we can clearly point out their errors and thus pass judgment upon them. In fact, there are certain people who do not endeavor to live for God themselves and are not careful to measure to the standard of His word; nevertheless, they are quick to censor those who turn aside from the truth.

Now I would say that before any one was qualified to pass judgment upon another, they must first be walking in all the light which they have. They must be endeavoring to do the will of God as far as they understand it. Otherwise, it is possible that the one with whom they would find fault may be more sin-



cere than they themselves. This ought not to be the case.

Let us especially notice the thought expressed in verse 2. Here it says, "For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again."

Now it is easy for us to understand that those who are brought before the judge desire to have favor in his sight. They are pleased for the judge to have mercy and compassion, but by the same token, let us ask ourselves, are we willing to have compassion upon others? Then I believe that if we can answer this in the affirmative and really feel deep down in our hearts that we have a sincere and earnest desire to help others, we will be in a better position to do so.

Or in other words, if we will first have the beam removed from our own eye, then will we see more clearly to pull out the mote from our brother's eye.

Now, no doubt, most of us are well aware that misunderstandings can come between the very closest of friends, and that so very easily. In fact, it may arise from a "hearsay" or a "rumor" which is not well founded at all. If the truth was only known, many times we find that our brother or our sister did not mean at all that which we thought was meant.

Now let me better illustrate it this way. Suppose that on one of our modern day train coaches a man and his wife were riding along, and in the meantime were in a casual conversation. We shall call their names Mr. and Mrs. Jones. Then just suppose that surrounding Mr. and Mrs. Jones in the coach were a number of other men with

their wives. Each intently listening to overhear the conversation of Mr. and Mrs. Jones.

Now to even better illustrate it, let us suppose that Mr. and Mrs. Smith sitting nearby overheard a statement which sounded to them as if Mr. Jones mentioned to his wife a "trained ear". From this point Mr. and Mrs. Smith began further speculating that the Joneses had been to a musical concert because he had mentioned a "trained ear".

In the meantime suppose Mr. and Mrs. Godfry sitting nearby overheard the same statement which Mr. Jones made to his wife and Mr. Godfry understood him to say something about a "reindeer". From this point Mr. Godfry would begin to elaborate and explain to his wife that, no doubt, the Joneses had been to a zoo and had seen the many animals among them which were some reindeer.

Then just to further complicate this matter, suppose Mr. Seymour sitting nearby with his wife overheard this same statement which Mr. Jones had made and he interpreted it a different way. The moment Mr. and Mrs. Seymour stepped from the train he looked all around him and exclaimed with a certain amount of amazement, "I don't see any signs of rain, and I am very positive that I heard Mr. Jones mention to his wife that "it rained here".

So you see friends, here would be one statement which Mr. Jones had made and three different people had overheard this statement and each came up with a different explanation. Then let us suppose that all had missed the true meaning of what Mr. Jones had told his wife for he had only mentioned to her that "I almost missed the train, dear."



Friends, can you see how far a little misunderstanding can spread. Let us be quick to make allowance for others and in the meantime guard our own lives and conversation very closely. Furthermore, let us be willing to have our lives judged by the standard which we impose upon others. Then and only then can we come to the place where the Lord would have us live together in peace and harmony as his children.

To better illustrate this point, listen now to this poem entitled:
