Now for our benefit and edification consider this scripture in Hebrews, chapter 12, and beginning at verse 1. "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and

the race that is set before us, Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God. For consider him that endured such contradiction of sinners against himself, lest ye be wearied and faint in your minds."

Now I like this scripture because it points out that it is possible to live a victorious life right here in this world. The verses preceding this are filled with experiences of those who have endured great suffering to maintain their faith in God, and yet in spite of all their persecutions they remained loyal and faithful to their heavenly father. All of this, of course, provides us with a

great multitude of witnesses that such a victorious life is possible. First of all we have the perfect example of our saviour, Jesus Christ. He is the one to whom we must look for grace if we would be overcomers.

Now in these perilous days in which we live there are those who seem to believe it impossible to maintain a constant victorious life of faith. I once met an old gentleman in the post office and he appeared to be quite aged. I inquired of him somewhat concerning his age. In fact, he was not too sure of his exact age, but mentioned that the last time he had checked on some records he told me about what that age was. But before leaving him, I inquired, "Are you saved? Do you live

for the Lord?" He came back with a statement to this effect. "Well, I try to, but do you know the people are so wicked these days until they won't let you live for the Lord?"

This is the attitude that many people take. They decide there are so many other people who are wicked and ungodly that it is impossible for one to live righteously.

Friends, let us be honest with ourselves and face the word of God with confidence. Christ came to this world to save his people from their sins. I am of the firm opinion that he is not only able to save us from our sins, but that he is willing and ready to do it the moment we meet the conditions of his word. Since we have considered that there have been those who were faithful, listen to the exhortation once again which was given in the first verse of this 12th chapter of Hebrews.

It says, "Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us," So the first requirement for us to do is to lay aside the sinful weight.

One may be ever so religious and pretend to be serving the Lord, but if the sinful things of life are still predominant in their lives, it is an evident fact that somewhere they have failed to meet these conditions.

King Saul when returning from the battle with the Amalekites also professed to the prophet Samuel that he had obeyed the voice of the Lord, for he said, "Blessed be thou of the Lord! I have performed the commandment of the Lord." But Samuel was not so easily deceived by the smooth words of Saul's profession, and he came back with this question. "What meaneth then this bleating of the sheep in mine ears, and the lowing of the oxen which I hear?"

Samuel knew that Saul had disobeyed the commandment of God so he went on to say, "Stay, and I will tell thee what the Lord hath said to me this night." When Samuel pointed out to Saul his disobedience, Saul began to make excuses for his sin. He blamed the people and endeavored to shift the responsibility to others, but he was rejected and from this moment on, the pleasure of God was removed from his life. He had embarked upon a dangerous voyage which ultimately led to his own destruc-Let me emphasize that we must with patience run this race if we would find favor in the sight of God at the close of our lives.

Or else we might be classed with the type of people mentioned in Galatians, chapter 5, and verse 7. I quote: "Ye did run well; who did hinder you that ye should not obey the truth?"

Here is mentioned the Galatian brethren who did accept the gospel teaching for a while, but then desired to return to the law. Indeed there are those today who once lived a life of faith, who once separated themselves from worldly amusements and sinful habits, but now they have grown weary and departed once again seeking for the pleasures which soon decay.

Friends, let me exhort you that we must have patience and perserverance in this Christian race. It is not enough to make a start, but we must continue with our life of faith. May we not be weary as the years to by, but let us gird on the gospel armour a little tighter and the helmet of salvation, above all taking the shield of faith with which we shall be able to be victorious even unto the very end. Let us spend a moment in prayer.

There may be those tonight listening

to this broadcast who have grown weary in this battle of faith and given up their struggle for the right. We pray that you would rekindle this fervent desire in their hearts to forsake every evil way and cling only to thee both now and forever, for we ask it in Christ's name. Amen
