"LIFT UP YOUR EYES, AND LOOK ON THE FIELDS; FOR THEY ARE WHITE ALREADY TO HARVEST." - JOHN 4:35

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. . . A very pleasant greeting to all the listeners of radio station XEG. This is Willie Murphey coming to you with another gospel message and speaking in behalf of all of THE MISSION TRAIL family of Guthrie, Oklahoma. We hope that each of you are well and happy in the service of the Lord, and let me assure you that if you are interested in God's service, there is plenty for you to do, and may I add that we deeply appreciate those who have stood by us with their prayers and letters of encouragement which help to make this broadcast possible. We sincerely hope that God will reward you a hundredfold for the service you render unto him.

Consider now this scripture reading in II Corinthians, chapter 4, and beginning at verse 7. "But

WE HAVE THIS TREASURE IN EARTHEN VESSELS,

that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us. We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; Persecuted, but not forsaken; cast down, but not destroyed; Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body."

I would like to especially point out that mankind in his natural state is void of the grace of God and a most miserable failure. Most people would be ready to acknowledge this, in fact, they seem to enjoy elaborating on the fact that mankind is sinful. Now the scriptures do teach that "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God." This is certainly true for we have experienced ourselves the bitter disappointments of our failures without the grace of God.

However, let us not stop here, but

I want to tell you about a Saviour which is able to reach down and change a sinful heart and a wicked life of sin and despair into one of joy and gladness. God is not only willing that you should be saved, but he is given the supreme sacrifice of his son that you might be redeemed from your sins and in place of the bitter regrets you should enjoy the peace and satisfaction of the knowledge that your sins are covered with the blood of the Saviour.

Now to the primary thought in this message consider a part of this 7th verse which says, "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us." So we see then that in this frail mortal frame of our earthly existence is the abiding presence of the all-powerful Saviour, and so because of his presence in the earthly house of our tabernacle we have nothing of which to boast for it is only

through his power that we are kept day by day. Let me remind you that this change which comes about will cause you to love your enemies and to do good to those who hate you.

Let us go back and take a look into the history of some of the great men of our nation. Take, for example, Abraham Lincoln. His chances of success in life were very limited. His mother died while Abraham Lincoln was yet a young child. His early comforts of life were quite limited, and we understand that he worked hard splitting rails in Illinois and at night would study and seek to gain more knowledge from a borrowed book by the flicker of the flames of an open fireplace.

Now I am not in a position to say what Abraham Lincoln's personal experience with God may have been. However, we do know that certain fundamental principles of faith were deeply instilled in his character. Furthermore we do know that the grace of God will cause one to even love his enemies.

Listen now to this touching experience of a Confederate General's wife, Mrs. La Salle Corbett Pickett.

"I was in Richmond when my soldier fought at the awful battle of Five Forks. Richmond surrendered, and the surging sea of fire swept the city. News of Five Forks reached us, and there was a report that General Pickett had been killed. I did not believe it, but I was very anxious.

"The day after the fire there was a sharp rap at the door. The servants had all run away. The city was full of Northern troops, and my environment had not taught me to love them. With my baby on my arm, I opened the door and looked upatatall, gaunt, sad-faced man in ill fitting clothes, who asked:

"Is this George Pickett's place?"

"Yes, sir," I answered. "But he is not here."

"I know that, ma'am," he replied.
"But I just wanted to see the place. I am Abraham Lincoln."

"The President!" I gasped. The stranger shook his head.

"No, ma'am; no, ma'am. Just Abraham Lincoln, George's old friend."

"I am George Pickett's wife and this is his baby," was all I could say.

I had never seen Mr. Lincoln, but I remembered the love and reverence with which my soldier always spoke of him.

"My baby pushed away from me, and reached out his hands to Mr. Lincoln, who took him into his arms. As he did so an expression of rapt, almost divine tenderness and love lighted up his sad face. It was a look that I have never seen on any other countenance. My baby opened his mouth wide, and insisted upon giving his father's friend a dewy, infantile kiss. As Mr. Lincoln gave the little one back to me, he shook his finger at him playfully, and said:

"Tell that rascal, your father, that I forgive him for the sake of that kiss and those bright eyes."

"He turned and went down the steps talking to himself, and passed out of my sight forever; but in my memory those intensely human eyes, that strong, sad face have a perpetual abiding place—that face which puzzled all artists, but which revealed itself to the intuitions of a child."
