. . . It is a real pleasure to be coming to the listeners of radio station XEG once again for our Friday evening visit. We hope that the time of 10:45 p.m. which is fifteen minutes earlier than we have normally been coming to you will please you very much and be more convenient for many of you to listen.

Let me explain that this is THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast of Guthrie, Oklahoma, and your speaker is Willie Murphey. We feel deeply indebted to those who have been so faithfully standing by to help us maintain this radio broadcast and share with us the expenses of publishing and mailing the weekly message. We sincerely desire that God may reward each one a hundredfold.

Tonight I would like to point out the great need for gospel workers both at home and abroad. I hope that the young people of today will seriously consider the dedication of their entire lives to the service of God, and that each one may have a testimony such as the Apostle Paul had which is recorded in Romans, chapter I, and beginning at verse 15. I quote: "So, as much as in me is,

I AM READY TO PREACH THE GOSPEL

to you that are at Rome also. For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth: to the Jew first, and also to the Greek. For therein is the righteousness of Godrevealed from faith to faith: as it is written, The just shall live by faith,"

Now I mentioned earlier in the press time news of a recent edition that for the broadcast at this time we were going to have the testimony from a brother in India. This we are going to read to you tonight, but first let us get an overall picture of the great need before God's church to carry the gospel into every corner of the world.

Now I do not single out India as being the most spiritually needy field in the world, for there are many places both at home and abroad where the people are hungry for the gospel. These we are endeavoring to reach, and it has brought a great satisfaction to us when we feel that in some small measure both by radio and publication, you and I have been able to reach a few of these precious souls.

Now to be more specific, let us lift up our eyes and look upon the fields of the world. This time let us imagine that we are on our way to India across the Atlantic. We might make a few stops in Southern Europe as we headed still further east around the southern end of Africa which would be south of the equator. There we might find ourselves crossing the Indian Ocean and going in an northeasternly direction

until finally after some distance of approximately halfway around the world we would arrive at the Asian country of India.

Now as many of you recall, last year Bro. Carver made a missionary trip to India and saw first hand this land with a population of 480 million people who speak a total of fourteen major languages. Think of it, friends, if you can, imagine how many this would be-480 million!

Now in January of 1966 there fell upon the shoulders of Indira Gandhi, a woman, if you please, the responsibility of prime minister of this great nation. Some of you may recall that earlier this year Madame Gandhi made a visit to the United States. Many were impressed by her elegance. Indeed, I think it would be in order just now as we think of the great need in India both temporally and spiritually, that we have it before us a standing request to remember Madame Gandhi and also this 480 million people that they may have more opportunities to see and know the real meaning of true Christianity.

Remember now the text which I gave you earlier. This was the testimony of Paul when he said, I am ready to preach the gospel to you who are at Rome also. Now just as he was ready to declare the wonderful works of God, even so I believe that we should be ready to speak the name of Christ both at home and abroad.

Let me share with you now the joy which came to my heart when I received this testimony from India. Here is one into whose hands fell a copy of The Mission Trail. I quote from his letter.

"Dear brother: Greetings to you in the name of Jesus Christ who said, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life.' "A few weeks back I happened to see your Mission Trail. I pleased very much when I went through your speech in it. Now, I like to write a testimony.

"I am the son of Brother C. M. Varghese. Iam now about to take my B. S. C. degree. During my long life as a student God helped me very much. Icame up to this level not because of my ability, but only due to the kindness which God showed to me. I am so grateful to God for how He has blessed and watched over me through these days. God for bringing me through the many burdens, crosses, fiery trials, tests and sorrows. I also thank Him for watching over me since my early childhood. From my experience of life I can now very well conclude that there is nothing too hard for God to do and He helps only those who trust Him and believe him. God permits us to be ill to test our faith and love in Him.

"Bro. Carver knows me very well because he stayed with us about a month during his missionary work in India. One day he visited our college where I completed my three year degree course. There he visited our laboratories.

"Now, I will try to include your work as a subject in my every day prayers. At the same time I request your prayers also for my future life. Expecting The Mission Trail of the next week I stop here now. Try to give me a reply. Your brother in Christ, John Varghese C."

End of letter. Now isn't that an encouraging letter. Just think, this young man knows what it is to have education, he knows what it is to attend the schools of higher learning, and yet he also recognizes that only God can satisfy the hearts of the millions of the world.

Friends, let us ask ourselves this question: "Am I doing my part to see

the gospel reach every nation of the world?" Then as we ponder this thought let us arise and put into action our decisions to reach as many in "the regions beyond" as possible while the door of opportunity is open. Let us seek out the means and ways of best doing this. Listen now as Patsy brings you this poem.
