. . . A very pleasant greeting to all the listeners of radio station XEG. This is THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast of Guthrie, Oklahoma, and your speaker is Willie Murphey coming to you once again with our weekly gospel message. The Bible text which I have for our lesson today may be a little somewhat different from that which you usually hear on a broadcast of this type. But it is a scripture and, I feel, a very important one. From Isaiah, chapter 28, and verse 20, we read:

"... THE BED IS SHORTER than that a man can stretch himself on it:

and the covering narrower than that he can wrap himself in it."

I shall endeavor to explain this scripture now in the light of other texts contained in the Bible. First let us consider it from a natural standpoint.

I remember a personal experience which a group of us had while traveling through the mountains a number of years ago. It was in the month of March, in fact, it was the 17th of March. Normally at this time of year the weather has warmed up somewhat, and one should not expect too much difficulty from icy roads and snow. But on this particular occasion as we were driving up the Continental Divide in New Mexico where the altitude becomes

higher and higher, we began to meet cars which showed some signs of having been in the snow.

And sure enough before long we began to encounter snow ourselves. The further we went, the worse it became until soon we were in a blinding snow storm, bearly able to detect the road. Now on a straight level road this is bad enough, but in the winding mountains it was much worse.

When we finally reached a small town and inquired about a cabin in which we might spend the night, we were informed that the cabins were pretty well filled already. Finally as a last resort, we were referred to a place where some cabins might be available which

were normally used for hunters to camp in during certain seasons of the year. We considered ourselves very fortunate after the man had opened up one of these small houses, started the heating stove to going, and made provisions for us to spend the night.

Now we did spend the night without any great discomfort, but, I tell you this to bring out further the thought which I have in mind. Think how unpleasant it would have been in such extreme weather if we should have been given a bed which was too short to stretch on.

Friends, did you ever try to stretch on a cot or a bed which was so short that you had to double up your knees to lie down? Then to add to your discomfort, suppose you had a quilt or blanket too narrow and short, but you tried to pull it down to cover your feet. Having done this, you would then find your shoulders exposed to the cold. After a little bit, perhaps you would decide, "Well, this will never do". So you would pull the quilt up around your shoulders. Then what happens? There are your feet and legs sticking out in the cold.

After a few hours of such uncomfortable sleeping, you might do what I once did when sleeping on a cot in Missouri one night in a tent. It became so cold that I got up and put on my clothes and then went back to my cot to rest, but I will assure you that I was glad when morning came.

Let us take the natural and apply it to the spiritual conditions which exists in the lives of many people. There are those who feel the need of turning away from their sinful habits and customs of life. They really desire to be clothed with the righteousness of God. But instead they seek an easy way,

hoping to find peace in their hearts by joining some man-made organization. This they do by merely professing to believe in God or offering to pay certain dues. Then they are admitted into one of the many so called churches of our modern day, having never really experienced any change of heart. For many people this seems to work fairly well for a while, but in time of adversity or trial or afflictions, they never seem to find the lasting peace and joy in their religion which the Bible teaches.

In other words, they are endeavoring to stretch themselves upon a bed which is too short, and they are trying to cover with a form of religion which is entirely too narrow for their comfort.

Listen to the reading of this scripture from Psalms, chapter 32 and beginning with versel. Iquote: "Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered. Blessed is the man unto whom the Lord imputeth not iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no guile."

Now I want to assure you that those who are genuinely and truly converted after they have repented have a reason to be happy, for this scripture said, "Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered." This does not mean their sin is barely or partially covered, but it means that one is completely forgiven and pardoned and set free to go on their way rejoicing.

I am of the firm opinion when such a transaction takes place in one's life, he is fully aware that there has been a change made, that he knows when and where this change takes place. And it is not like someone trying to stretch upon a cot which is too short for his comfort or like one trying to pull the cover over his feet but then his shoulders are left exposed.

My advice to all who hear this message is to be certain that you have made your calling and election sure. Otherwise you might come face to face with the solemn realities of life, and there find that you have only been thinly protected with a shallow profession without a heart-felt change in your life.

I am reminded of some poetry which I learned many years ago. This was written by William Cullen Bryant in his teens who was a very early American writer. It says:

"So live, that when thy summons comes to join

The innumerable caraven, which moves
To that mysterious realm where each
shall take

His chamber in the silent halls of death,

Thou go not, like the quarry slave at night,

Scourged to his dungeon, but, sustained and soothed

By an unfaltering trust, approach thy grave,

Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch

About him, and lies down to pleasant dreams."

Friends, the thing which I am talking about is this: real genuine heart-felt, born-again assurance comes only by the word and the spirit of God. It will not only give you assurance in life, but it will provide comfort and strength when you walk through the valley of the shadow of death.

If there should be one listening to this broadcast tonight who is seeking the road to heaven by a short cut, we hope that this will be the turning point in your life and that from here on you will not try to rest upon a bed which is too short or endeavor to cover with a blanket which is too narrow.

Let us spend a moment in prayer.

Our Father.

We are reminded of the scripture which says there is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death. We pray that if there should be one listening to this broadcast tonight who is lost in the fogs of confusion, that you would be pleased to let the true light from heaven illuminate their hearts and cause that the word of truth may spring up and grow, which will not only be a blessing to others, but an anchor to them in the time of storm, and to thee we'll give the praise through Christ our Saviour. Amen
