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. . . It is with pleasure that we come by radio to the listeners of this powerful radio station XEG. This is THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast of Guthrie, Oklahoma, and your speaker is Willie Murphey. We are coming to you again with another gospel message. We are indeed happy to report that God has been blessing his word and our hearts have been warmed many times by the response which we get both from those who listen to the broadcast and also from those who get the printed copies each week.

To the new listeners who might like to be added to our mailing list, let me assure you that you may have these copies mailed to you without charge or obligation by simply sending us your request upon a post card or in a letter. And if we may assist you in a spiritual problem or if you are sick and desire prayer, do not hesitate to let us know of your request that we may join with you in an agreement of prayer.

But now for our scripture lesson today let us begin in Hebrews, the sixth chapter with verse nine. I quote: "But, beloved, we are persuaded better things of you, and things that accompany salvation, though we thus speak. For God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love, which ye have shewed toward his name, in that ye have ministered to the saints, and do minister. And we desire that every one of you do shew the same diligence to the full assurance of hope unto the end: That ye be not slothful, but followers of them who through faith and patience inherit the promises. For when God made promise to Abraham, because he could swear by no greater, he sware by himself, Saying, surely blessing I will bless thee, and multiplying I will multiply thee. And so,

AFTER HE HAD PATIENTLY ENDURED,

he obtained the promise. "

We so often think of the patience of Job and the trials which he endured, but there are many other prophets which endured great persecutions because of their trust in God. However at this time, please consider the patriarch Abraham.

Now Abraham was seventy-five years old when God first called him from the

land of Ur of the Chaldees. Perhaps Abraham was not aware that his name would go down in Bible history as the father of the faithful. Perhaps he did not aspire to the greatness which came his way, but be that as it may, along with these promises came many trials of his faith.

In Genesis, chapter 12 and verse 3, we read of the promise which God made to Abraham. He said, "And I will bless

them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee: and in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed. " Here then was the promise which God made to Abraham.

After Abraham had obeyed the voice of God and departed from the land of his people, we read in Genesis, chapter 13 and beginning with verse 14 some of the promises which God made to him. "And the Lord said unto Abram, after that Lot was separated from him, Lift up now thine eyes, and look from the place where thou art northward, and southward, and eastward, and westward: For all the land which thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed for ever. And I will make thy seed as the dust of the earth: so that if a man can number the dust of the earth, then shall thy seed also be numbered. Arise, walk through the land in the length of it and in the breadth of it; for I will give it unto thee. "

Well, this sounds like some wonderful promises which God made to Abraham, but if Abraham had been like some people whom we know today, after about thirty or sixty days, he would have become discouraged. He would have considered that the promises were worthless because they had not come to pass immediately.

But not so with Abraham. He waited long and patiently for the fulfillment of these promises. The Lord tried him. He was no doubt tempted by Satan, opposed by men full of jealousy and distrust. But imagine, if you can, the magnitude of such a promise which God has made--that all the families of the earth would be blessed through his seed. And then imagine, if you can, that Abraham was 100 years old when Isaac his son was born; his wife Sarah was 90 years old. This is rather a ripe old age to begin a family whose de-

scendants would be as the stars of heaven for multitude or as the sands of the seashore for number.

But we are told in Romans, chapter 4 and verse 3 that: "Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." Inother words, Abraham was patiently enduring that he might receive the fulfillment of God's promises. His patience was tried by his relatives, his endurance was tested by his enemies, and his faith was placed in the furnace by the Almighty that it might be purified and polished.

Some things, then, to remember from Abraham's life are well worth pointing out. Patience in the midst of trial is a virtue that God does not overlook, believing expectation is a jewel which will be polished more brightly as God tries one's faith. Abraham's conduct condemns a hasty spirit, reproves a complaining one, encourages a patient one, and points out the way for others to yield themselves in quiet submission to God's will and way.

Remember now Abraham was tried but patiently endured. After the waiting came the fulfillment, for it was through Abraham that Christ came forth as the lion of the tribe of Judah to fulfill the promise of God in bringing deliverance to all people in all nations throughout the world. It is through Christ Jesus that we have hope and deliverance with a promise of eternal life.

Friends, if you should grow a little weary along the way of life, let meencourage you to patiently endure. Hold steadfast, unmovable, while yet believing that God will in his own time and way fulfill his promise to you in a personal manner. Be not moved about by every wave and wind of doctrine, but be established and settled in the truth,

even though the winds may blow contrary to the course which you have chosen to pursue. To further add to your encouragement, listen now to this poem entitled:

CONTRARY WINDS By Leslie C. Busbee

I saw the morning air express
Roar over-head in threat ning power;
Her wings were tilted in a stress
Against the south-tide of the hour.

I watched her as far down the sky
She left my wide and wondering view
