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MON MONO "LIFT UP YOUR EYES, AND LOOK ON THE FIELDS; FOR THEY ARE WHITE ALREADY TO HARVEST" - JOHN 435 WOND WORLD

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. . . We are indeed happy to be coming to the listeners of radio station XEG once again with the gospel message for this week. We are made to rejoice in the blessings of the Lord which we receive from time to time, and we desire to share these blessings with others.

Then, too, we do appreciate those who help us keep this message on the air. Our postage continues to increase for the mailing of the printed copies, but we are indeed thankful to God and his people for their interest in His work. Our sincere wish is that God may richly bless each one who helps us spread the gospel of the good news of salvation. To those who desire to write us, let me say that you may do so by addressing us in this way: THE MISSION TRAIL, Guthrie, Oklahoma. And, of course, my name is Willie Murphey.

For our scripture reading today I want to bring you some thoughts expressed in the 4th chapter of Philippians, beginning with verse II. "Not that I speak in respect of want: for

I HAVE LEARNED

in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content. I know both how to be abased, and I know how to abound: every where and in all things I am instructed both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need. I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

There are two distinct thoughts expressed in these verses. One of them I want to talk to you about today. The other one we plan to use on the next broadcast. Our thought for now, then, is found in verse 11. It expresses the fact that the apostle Paul had learned to be content with whatever his conditions in life were from day to day.

I am sure he was not speaking of the time before his conversion when he was on the road to Damascus with letters of authority to persecute the saints and take them into custody causing some of them to blaspheme.

To this early life, no doubt, there were many heartaches, disappointments and much restlessness and discontentment. Surely he was not happy with conditions existing before the Lord brought peace to his heart.

Nevertheless, he had learned many things. His education was one of the best in that day. His chances for success seemed good, yet I think of his life in connection with the scripture found in Isaiah, chapter 57, verses 20 and 21.

Here we read these words: "But the wicked are like the troubled sea,

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when it cannot rest, whose waters cast up mire and dirt. There is no peace, saith my God, to the wicked. " These verses clearly point out a class of people who are not content with their conditions in life. They're in trouble but seem to be unable to find a solution to their problems. The fact then remains that the trouble stems from an inward One may have the discontentment. learning of the world; he may also have the possessions needed to last him for many years along with plenty of food and clothing, but if this inward desire and search for God is unsatisfied, he is in a most miserable condition.

Perhaps there are some listening to our broadcast this very high who realize that this is their state in life. You may be driving along in your automobile, you may be at home, or by your bedside, but wherever you may be listening to this broadcast tonight, we want you to know that if there is a longing in your heart for peace and satisfaction, this can only come through the atoning blood of Christ our Saviour. In other words, you can learn to be contented with the outward circumstances if you are at peace with God in your heart.

I am of the opinion that Paul knew when he was in the center of the will of God, and he knew that if God was for him, it mattered little whether others agreed with him or disagreed. It mattered little whether they administered to his needs or whether he went hungry. He knew that he was doing the will of God.

Friends, let me tell you something-this is the great need in our world today and that is that each one of us so place ourselves without reserve in the hands of God who understands our needs better than we could tell him with our lips that in this way he will be able to use us in

His service and certainly it brings a contentment to our hearts. He understands the longings of every heart, and he knows how to satisfy the vacancy in your heart regardless of your condition.

Listen once again to the testimony of the apostle Paul in Hebrews, chapter 13 and verses 5 and 6. Here we read: "Let your conversation be without covetousness: and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee. So that we may boldly say, The Lord is my helper, and I will not fear what man shall do unto me."

This sounds to me like the apostle Paul really found the springs of living water which brought contentment to him. He was not afraid of what others could do for he knew that God was standing nearby.

Then listen once again to his testimony found in Romans, chapter 14 and verse 8. Here he said: "For whether we live, we live unto the Lord; and whether we die, we die unto the Lord: whether we live therefore, or die, we are the Lord's."

Someone might saythen, "Yes, perhaps Paul was satisfied, but he was an exceptional man. There are no more like him today."

Yes, Iagree, Paul was an exceptional man; but I do not agree with those who seem to think that people in our day cannot obtain satisfaction and peace from God. I do not believe that God is a respector of persons. What he has done for one he is able to do for another.

Listen now to this testimony of an aged saint who is 87 years old. I quote from a letter we recently received from her.

From California: "Dear Bro. Willie Murphey and family, Greetings in the love of Jesus and in his dear name. am praising my dear Lord and Saviour for victory in body and soul. He saved my soul from sin and the world, sanctified my nature, and has been my physician for 60 years or more and has never lost a case. I will be 88 years, 3rd day of March, if it's God's will for me to live that long. B. Wilson, our pastor, said to methis morning I may make it to 100 years, but I don't think I want to. But I told him I am in Lord's hands, if that would be his will and he could get any glory out of my life, I would say amen. . . Sis. Murtis Hurst has loaned me her Mission Trail to read, so I would like to have it sent to me. . . We want to keep heaven in view and watch and pray that we will be ready any minute. . . " This letter was received from Sister Emma Luehring.

Thank you, Sister Luehring, for this most encouraging letter. May God continue to cause your life to bear fruit for Him that others may know what it means to find contentment such as you have expressed in your letter.

To make this message even more complete, listen to these words from I Timothy, chapter 6 and beginning with verse 6. It says: "But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. And having food and raiment let us be therewith content.

"But they that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition. For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows.

"But thou, O man of God, flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness. Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, whereunto thou art also called, and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses."

Let us spend a moment in prayer.

Our Father,

Take the words of the message today and carry them by thy spirit to the hearts of those who may be restless and discontented because they have not yet found the peace of God which passeth all understanding. May they soon learn to be contented with thy blessings for we ask it in Jesus' name. Amen
