ON COMON "LIFT UP YOUR EYES, AND LOOK ON THE FIELDS; FOR THEY ARE WHITE ALREADY TO HARVEST" - JOHN 435 COMON COMO

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. . . A pleasant greeting to all the listeners of radio station XEG. This is Willie Murphey coming to you with another gospel message which we hope will bring cheer and comfort and help you along life's pathway.

We do appreciate your encouraging letters which you have written and your prayers and support which have helped us maintain this weekly broadcast. Those who desire to write us may address their letter in this way: THE MISSION TRAIL, Guthrie, Oklahoma.

I have a text which I consider a very important one. If all the parents would follow the instructions of this scripture in Ephesians 6:4, I am sure that the world would be a much better place in which to live. I am sure that many of the evils committed by the young people could and would be avoided as a result of the teaching of their parents.

Listen as I read to you this verse, "And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but

BRING THEM UP IN THE NURTURE AND ADMONITION OF THE LORD."

Now really, what I want you parents to do for the next few minutes is to consider your duty in regard to your children. There falls a solemn obligation upon each parent the moment a new child is born into the world. This obligation is first to God and then to the child. Therefore, we would do well to keep ourselves informed of our duties to our children.

We notice then from our text that it is the duty of fathers to bring up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. In other words, the children should be taught their obligations and privileges of serving God. Fathers should not use their children as a source of entertainment for themselves even at the expense and happiness of

their children. Children are not to be picked at and tormented until they feel that even their own parents are against them.

Listen to this instruction for the young women from Titus 2:4. We read, "That they may teach the young women to be sober, to love their husbands, to love their children."

Yes, how true it is, my friend, that many of us today who has assumed the responsibilities of manhood and womanhood can look back over the years and now realize how much we owe to the invaluable instructions given us by our parents.

Listen to this poem entitled:

AN ECHO OF THE YEARS
"Rock of Ages, cleft for me--"
Mother sang it long ago,
Sang it low and soothingly,
Rocking in the afterglow.
Sang it to me as I slept
In my snowy trundle-bed,
As the lengthening shadows crept
Eerie-like about my head.

"Let me hide myself in Thee--"
Still I hear it echo there,
As she sang it o'er to me,
From her swaying rocking chair;
And I am a boy again,
As so sweetly back along
Distant years I catch the strain
Of that old familiar song.

"Other refuge have I none--"
Often in the long, long years
I have missed the touch of one
Who could soothe my doubts and fears.
One to whom I used to go
With each boyish grief and care.
Sometimes in the afterglow,
I catch glimpses of her there.

"Rock of Ages--" and I feel
Mother's arm about me pressed,
As to her embrace I'd steal
To be rocked away to rest.
Dreamy-like once more I hear
Softly, gently, soothingly,
That faint echo in my ear:
"Let me hide myself in Thee."

I like the thoughts expressed in that poem. I believe that if a child can be made to realize that it is wanted and loved by its parents, it will be of great assistance to him in the years ahead as he grows older to face a cold and unfriendly world. It will help to stabilize his life from the winds of adversity which sweep so many over the precipice of a wrecked and ruined life.

Proverbs 22:6 tells us that we should "Train up a child in the way he should

go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

Fathers and mothers, parents, let me speak to you with an open heart. Let me ask you this question. "Are you taking the time to instruct your boys and girls, your sons and daughters, in the way you wish them to live in life? Are you so busy with your own affairs that you are glad when the boys and girls are out of your way?

If so, then it would be well for you to listen while I read this scripture from Deuteronomy 10:18-19. "Therefore shall ye lay up these my words in your heart and in your soul, and bind them for a sign upon your hand, that they may be as frontlets between your eyes. And ye shall teach them your children, speaking of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

Let me show you another duty of parents. As they train and instruct their children in the ways of God, they should not fail to correct them when they need it. If correction was made at an early stage in life, it would save the law enforcement officers much trouble in later years as the child grows older.

Listen to this scripture in Proverbs 19:18. "Chasten thy son while there is hope, and let not thy soul spare for his crying."

Again in Proverbs 29:17 we read, "Correct thy son, and he shall give thee rest; yea, he shall give delight unto thy soul."

Now I do not mean that parents should beat their children unmercifully just because they themselves are angry. I believe correction should be done

with the spirit of humility, realizing our obligation before God. In fact, it might be well as you counsel your son and correct him to also join in prayer together with him that God may be the helper of each one.

If you will read Psalms 103:13, I believe you will better understand what I mean. It says here, "Like as a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear him."

You see, it is also our duty to pray for our children. King David realized the great responsibility falling upon the shoulders of his son Solomon. Listen to his prayer from I Chronicles 29:19. "And give unto Solomon my son a perfect heart, to keep thy commandments, thy testimonies, and thy statues, and to do all these things and to build the palace, for the which I have made provision."

Friends, if you fail along these lines, it is quite possible that in the years to come you will feel remorse and regret that you took not more time with your sons and daughters. Listen to this poem entitled:

It is not so much the things I do That causes me regret; It's the little things I leave undone, The things that I forget.

It's the words I fail to utter, The songs I fail to sing, The letters I forget to write, That may great comfort bring.

It's the little acts of kindness, The joy I fail to give, The smiles I fail to scatter, As day by day I live.

It's the sick I fail to visit, Flowers I fail to send;

It's the hand I fail to offer Unto a fallen friend.

It's not so much the things I do
That causes me regret;
It's the little things I leave undone,
The things that I forget.
