Listen now to our text from Isaiah, chapter 32 and verse 20,

You see, when Christ gave his final instructions to his disciples in Matthew 28 and verses 19 and 20, we read, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world.
