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. . . It brings me great joy to again present the Word of Godover this powerful station XEG. A very cheerful greeting to all those who are tuned to THE MISSION TRAIL of Guthrie, Oklahoma. This is Willie Murphey speaking to you. Before I bring to you the message from the word, let me tell you that this broadcast is given with the hope that there may be some listening who are searching for the truth. If so, we hope that the thoughts and scriptures selected may be just the ones for your particular need.

Our work is a work of faith, and it is supported largely by those who are willing to contribute to see the gospel go forth both by radio and the printed weekly message. You see, we also offer these messages in print each week free of charge to those who wish to have their names added to our mailing list. Listen now to one of my favorite parables from the mouth of our Lord. In the book of Mark the fourth chapter and beginning with verse three we read,

"HEARKEN: BEHOLD, THERE WENT OUT A SOWER TO SOW:

And it came to pass, as he sowed, some fell by the way side, and the fowls of the air came and devoured it up. And some fell on stony ground, where it had not much earth; and immediately it sprang up, because it had no depth of earth; But when the sun was up, it was scorched; and because it had no root, it withered away. And some fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up, and choked it, and it yielded no fruit. And other fell on good ground, and did yield fruit that sprang up and increased; and brought forth, some thirty, and some sixty, and some an hundred."

For the next few moments I want to speak to you concerning our obligation

to sow the gospel seed. In this parable the seed is likened unto the word of God. The sower went forth into his field, scattering the precious grain all around him. It is true that not all of it yielded fruit, because some of it fell by the wayside. It was not long until the birds had devoured it, so, of course, it could not bring forth fruit.

Did you ever hear the expression that some people let things go into one ear and out the other. Well, that is just about true in the manner in which some people receive the gospel. Young people and teen-agers sometimes consider that it is the old folks who need to read the Bible and think about eternity

and where they are going when they leave this world. Therefore, little time or thought is spent by them in serious or deep meditation. We hope that is not the case with all, in fact, we know that it isn't because we do know that some young people are very seriously in earnest about serving the Lord and dedicated to His cause.

Then some men, likewise, consider that the Word of God and the gospel is suitable for the women, but there are too many things from which they would be restrained should they give up their sinful life. I would say that it is people like these that Jesus spoke about in this parable. Satan came immediately and devoured the word before it had time to profit them.

Nevertheless, it is still my duty and your duty to tell others of the gospel message. It is not for us to always know how much good or profit may come from sowing the seed.

There is another class of people shown here. These are the ones which are likened unto stony ground. seed sprang up and grew momentarily, but when the sun came forth, it withered There are many who have a away. They know it is love for the truth. right; they admire those who live by its precepts, and sometimes they even venture to try it themselves. But when a few trials come, it seems that the way is too straight and the obligation is too great, so they give it up. Iwonder if there is one hearing the broadcast tonight that would be in this class.

Notice the third type of ground shown in this parable. That is where the seed fell among the thorns. No doubt, the ground was plenty fertile, but this is an illustration of some people who have good and honest hearts and really good intentions. But somewhere along the way the cares and problems of life, and the responsibilities which they face from day to day overcome them, and they really never accomplish very much for God.

Of course, I like best of all the thought that some of the seed fell into good ground and yielded fruit. Even so, it is the will of God that his word be spread abroad into every nation, kindred, tongue, and people that all may have an opportunity to follow its precepts.

In Psalm 126, verses 5 and 6 we read, "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

Here also is a verse found in Deut. 22:9 which has a spiritual meaning. It says, "Thou shalt not sow thy vine-yard with divers seeds: lest the fruit of thy seed which thou hast sown, and the fruit of thy vineyard, be defiled." Now what I have been talking to you about is pertaining to good seed or the gospel message. A godly life and a good example are necessary for those who would sow the Word.

But when one attempts to sow good seed and evil at the same time, this is breaking the commandments of God. The ancient Jews were here instructed to sow only one type of seed in their fields at the same time. The seed must not be mixed.

Friends, I wonder if there might be some hearing this broadcast tonight who are endeavoring to serve God on the one hand and on the other hand, they are serving the enemy of their souls and indulging in many things which lead to evil and lead them away from the true way.

Another verse we should constantly bear in mind is found in Ecclestiastes II:4. "He that observeth the wind shall not sow; and he that regardeth the clouds shall not reap." We so often want conditions to be just ideal for our efforts which are put forth for God. Otherwise, it is so easy for us to wait thinking that at a later time it will be better. This is often a mistake. We are instructed to sow the word freely without waiting for conditions to be better.

On the night of October 8, 1871, D. L. Moody had been preaching in the city of Chicago as he had done many Sunday nights before. But upon this particular occasion, Mr. Moody made what he considered the greatest blunder he ever made in his life. The courthouse bell was sounding an alarm of fire, but he paid no attention to it. They were accustomed to hear the firebell often, and it did not disturb them.

He finished his sermon upon "What shall I do with Jesus?" and said to the audience: "Now, I want you to take the question with you and think it over, and next Sunday I want you to come back and tell me what you are going to do with Him."

"What a mistake!" he said afterward; it seems as if Satan was in my mind when I said it. Since then I have never dared to give an audience a week to think of their salvation. If they were lost, they might rise up in judgment against me."

The tragic part of that mistake was

that much of Chicago was burned to the ground and the next morning lay in ashes. Their place of meeting did not escape the flames, and the buildings were destroyed also. Who can tell the results of what may befall us if we delay in scattering the gospel seed. Let us pray.

Our Father,

We pray for divine assistance that we may freely and boldly sow the gospel seed among all the nations of the world. Bless those who hear the broadcast tonight, and may it kindle in them a fervent desire to be more diligent in scattering the gospel for we ask it in Jesus' name. Amen

"Come ye yourselves apart. . . and rest a while." Mark 6:31

The life of a missionary is a strenuous one, and a change in routine often provides a much needed rest as the following letter from Missouri indicates.

June 20, 1967, Route 2, Granby, Missouri 64844.

"Dear Ones, We send heavenly greetings in Jesus' name today. Just a note to say that my visit at home is fast coming to a close. The Lord allowed me to be here for my last brother's graduation and to my brother David's wedding. The Lord worked in a marvelous way for my coming home, and

I am so grateful to God for his great love to me and to each one of His people.

"During the time that the Lord permitted me to be home I have done many things that are not the general routine of life of a missionary, but I have thoroughly enjoyed every minute of it. First of all I have taken in the beautiful country and weather. Unlike dry and extremely hot Ejido Patzcuaro, the weather has been so cool and nice with good showers and rain. In Ejido Patzcuaro and that vicinity of Mexico and United States the anual average of rainfall is a small percentage of an inch. A person never appreciates the beauty of God's beautiful handiwork in the green country side, trees, birds, flowers, rain, and many other things until they are away from them for a while.

"The privilege to help in all the duties of farm life, even to the hauling of hay and work in the garden, is very different from life in Mexico where I live.

"The Lord permitted me to go to Arkansas with Sis. Ruth Murphey and to meet the saints in Grubbs, Arkansas. We were able to visit in the Shreveport, La. congregation and to be in services there and to visit Bro. and Sis. Carver. We also went to Monroe, La. and were in Bro. and Sis. Goldsberry's home. It's so good to be with the saints, our own family.

"I have visited in neighbors' homes, some of whom are ill and in the homes of my brothers and sisters in Kansas City. I am so glad for all these many blessings and feel refreshed now to return to the little place of labor in this great world of ours where God has placed me to work for Him. I would appreciate your prayers that I will be faithful in every way to the people there and to the saints and to my Lord. Your Sister in Christ," --Edith Cole P. O. Box 1425, Calexico, California

From Ohio: "Dear Bro. and Sister Murphey and family, Greetings of love in our precious Saviour's name. A few lines tonight while you all are on our mind--trust this finds all well and encouraged. .
