Let Your Light So Shine Before Men

(Radio broadcast on KOMA Sunday, July 2, 1967.)

. . . A pleasant good morning to all the listeners of radio station KOMA. It is a real pleasure to bring to the listeners of this radio station our short gospel message of THE MISSION TRAIL. This is Willie Murphey speaking to you. To some, no doubt, this will be your first acquaintance with us and the work which we are endeavoring to do for the cause of God. I hope that this may be the beginning of a real and lasting friendship for many of those who have not heard The Mission Trail broadcast before. This is our first broadcast over radio station KOMA, and we are looking forward to having many more.

Then, to those who have been regular listeners and readers of The Mission Trail, of course, no introduction to you is necessary. Many of you are familiar with our work and have helped to make it possible that the message can now be heard over radio station KOMA. We know that some of you have eagerly looked forward for this day of July 2. Certainly we have looked forward to it with anticipation.

Now a few other words by way of introduction seems necessary that I should explain who I am and for what purpose we are here. First, my name is Willie Murphey. I live in Guthrie, Oklahoma, just a few miles north of Oklahoma City. I am and have been a minister of the gospel for many years. However, in recent years God has intrusted me and my family with the privilege of presenting the gospel by means of radio.

We are now in our third year of broadcasting The Mission Trail. My wife Frances and I have two grown daughters, Kathleen and Patsy. We also have two sons of school age. We are happy to be bringing this message to our listeners and readers.

You see, this broadcast is obtainable in printed form each week and is mailed free of charge to those who request it. If you are not one of those who are regularly receiving the printed copies, be sure to send us your name and address at once that we may include it in our weekly mailing list. There is no cost or obligation. Address your letter to: The Mission Trail, Guthrie, Oklahoma. This is all the address needed for your letter to reach us.

Let me explain further that we not only preach the gospel by faith, but we trust the Lord to supply the needs of our household and also for the expenses of this broadcast. God has been faithful and has not failed us, and we believe that through your prayers and

co-operation we may also reach other hearts who are hungry for the plain simple truths of the Bible.

Now this seems to be sufficient to let you know who I am and for what purpose I am here. From here on, we hope that our messages from the word of God shall speak for themselves.

In Matthew, chapter 5 and verse 16 we read these words. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." With this scripture in mind, I want you now to listen to this poem entitled:

HIS LAMP AM I

His lamp am I
To shine where He shall say;
And lamps are not for sunny rooms,
Nor for the light of day;
But for the dark places of the earth,
Where shame and wrong and crime have birth,

Or for the murky twilight gray
Where wandering sheep have gone astray,

From the verse which I read we see that God's people are to set forth an example to all men everywhere which will be as a light to shine even to the darkest corners of the world. I believe that when one's life has been transformed by the saving knowledge of Christ, it will be a reproof to sin and an encouragement to those who are seeking the truth.

If you don't mind, I would like to go back and pick up an illustration from the years of my youth. This has been some while ago as on my last birthday I was fifty years old. But as a child at home in the days which are gone, we did not have electric lights in our home until later years. Perhaps many of you will remember the time when lights were made by the use of kerosene lamps. And even yet the word "kerosene" seems a little too refined, so I would like to use the word which we used at that time. It was "coal oil" lamps. Do you know what a coal oil lamp is?

Well, it is a lamp which makes a little flickering light, that is in comparison to a hundred watt electric light bulb. It has a wick which often requires trimming. One end of the wick reaches into a container holding oil and the burner is surrounded by a "chimney" or "globe". Of course, this is made of glass and is easily breakable.

I wonder how many of you hearing this broadcast today ever had the job of cleaning the chimneys or trimming the wicks of a coal oil lamp? The reason for a clean-up job is simple-that the lamp may more brightly shine to those around it. It works best in a dark room.

Therefore, I believe that God's children are the lights of the world that all men may see and know the truth. You and I should keep the love of God burning brightly in our bosom that it may beam out brightly to those about us from day to day.

As the darkness of evil powers of hatred and envy crowd more closely, we hope that each of you will let God's light shine more brightly in your life. This is no time for our lights to go out, but it is a time when they should be trimmed and brightly shining. Surely, there are many around us living in darkness who know not the truth. If your love for God has grown cold, we hope that this will be the time when you will trim the wick and polish the globe of your lamp.
