# "Almost a Christian"

(Radio broadcast on KOMA Sunday, July 30, 1967.)

... A very pleasant good morning to all the listeners of radio station KOMA. We hope that all of you are well and happy and enjoying the blessings of the Lord today. This is THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast of Guthrie, Oklahoma coming your way once again by means of radio. Your speaker is Willie Murphey. I count it a real privilege to speak in defense of the gospel and in behalf of Christ our Saviour. We do this in the interest of the Lord's people everywhere. Listen now to this 28th verse from the 26th chapter of Acts. It says, "Then Agrippa said unto Paul, Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian."

Many of you, Iam sure, are familiar with the life of the Apostle Paul. You may remember how that he was a very strict Pharisee, but Christ spoke to him on the road to Damascus one day, and his life was changed.

Instead of persecuting the saints, he became one of them. Instead of seeking to destroy the gospel, he began to build it up. In doing so, he met with much opposition. The opposition was not coming so much from those who made no pretense of being a believer, but it came from the chief priests, the Pharisees and the professors of that day. Those who pretended to serve God were the ones that brought the pressure to bear against the life of Paul.

Therefore, in due course of time, Paul found himself face to face with the bonds and the persecutions which had been promised. Now I want you to get the picture here. First, Paul was brought before Felix the procurator of Judea. Now remember that we are dealing with the Jews and also the mighty Roman empire which appointed these governors and kings.

It is written of Paul and Felix in Acts 24:25 that, "As he reasoned of righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come, Felix trembled, and answered, Go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee."

I am inclined to believe that this is the case with many people today. They are waiting for a more convenient season to do the things which they ought to do today.

But let us go on. Another governor or procurator named Festus came down to Cesarea, and he was interested in hearing Paul. Therefore, once

again Paul was called in question before the governors. Many of the Jews and Pharisees wanted to catch Paul and take his life, but somehow, God prevented this and spared him yet to witness before more kings and rulers.

I want you to imagine, if you can, the pomp and show of that day when the famous and unforgettable words of Agrippa were said, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." It was a real parade of show, of power, and authority when King Agrippa entered into the place of Judgment with the chief captains and principal men of the city, with his sister Bernice, and Festus.

You see, Festus did not know what to accuse Paul of, and he hoped that he might be able to have somewhat to write to Ceaser after Paul was brought before King Agrippa. In verse 27, chapter 25 of Acts, we read, "For it seemeth to me unreasonable to send a prisoner, and not withal to signify the crimes laid against him." You know that would be a rather embarrassing situation to be placed in -- to have a prisoner and then not know what to accuse him of.

But it seems that God had a purpose in Paul being bound. That purpose and plan was carried out by him being able to witness for Christ among the kings and those who had authority. Paul reasoned and showed that Christ was the son of God, and that it was through him that the believers were to be saved. Festus accused him of being mad because he had so much learning, but Paul said, "I am not mad, most noble Festus; but speak torth the words of truth and soberness."

Now King Agrippa was expert in the customs of the Jews even though he

was a part of the Roman Empire. No doubt, these things must have moved his heart. Perhaps he himself felt a need of the saving grace of Christ. Perhaps he realized that it was a losing battle which he was fighting against the wicked Jews who wanted to put Paul to death. I really believe that King Agrippa in his heart would have liked to have seen Paul set free, but Paul had appealed unto Ceaser, and Agrippa would have had a hard job to turn him loose.

But here are the words which I want to stay with you. Let me give them to you once more from Acts 26 and verse 28. "Then Agrippa said unto Paul, Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Friends, I do not know whether King Agrippa was ever fully persuaded to accept Christ or not. It is quite likely that he was caught with the tide of public opinion and swept along in this condition without Christ in his life.

But I would like to emphasize his words. "Almost thou persuadest me." It is not enough to be almost persuaded. Almost means near or close. One might come ever so near a place and yet not be there. I once heard about a man who was running a race. He was ahead and leading his opponent, but through the groans and puffing of the man behind him, he became distracted and lost the race. Yes, he almost won, but he failed.

Friends, Felix and Festus and King Agrippa had their day of choice. Felix trembled. Festus said that Paul was mad, and Agrippa said, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." These men and others have lived their lives, but you and I are faced today with a choice which we are required to make. It is an important choice, but

it should be made of one's own free will. I cannot choose for you. Your parents cannot choose for you. Neither can your wife or husband choose for you. We cannot force you.

The Apostle Paul could not force King Agrippa to be a Christian. But it is the most important choice which all of us are called upon to make in life. This choice, if made for God, will bring a change in one's heart and life. True repentance and a living faith will bring happiness. Your home will be a better place in which to live. Your state and your nation will be a better place for yourself and others when you make the correct choice to serve God.

There is a little touch of sadness about anyone being "almost" persuaded. One may come ever so close to heaven and yet be turned away. The rich young ruler who knelt before Christ wanted to know what to do to be saved. looked at him and loved him. He reminded him to keep the commandments. The young ruler said, "All these have I observed from my youth up, what lack I yet?" He came close to being a Christian, but Jesus said, "One thing thou lackest yet". But somehow he must have had his heart set upon that one thing--that was his riches. He went away sorrowful for he had great possessions. He came close, but I doubt if he ever returned to find Christ in his life.

Friends, let me make this personal appeal to you. Are you almost persuaded? Are you in doubt? Are you unconcerned? May God help you to be not almost persuaded, but fully persuaded and wholly given to the cause of Christ. If you have made failures in the past, may God help you to commit them from this day on and let the

blood of Christ erase them from your lives.

Yesterday now is a part of forever; Bound up in a sheaf, which God holds tight,

With glad days, and sad days, and bad days which never

Shall visit us more with their bloom and their blight,

Their fullness of sunshine or sorrow-ful night.

Let them go, since we cannot retrieve them.

Cannot undo and cannot atone; God in His mercy receive, forgive them! Only the new days are our own. Today is ours, and today alone.

I hope that each of you will be not "almost persuaded" but "fully persuaded" to commit your lives into the hands of God. Let us pray.

Even as the Apostle Paul was not "almost" but "fully" persuaded to do thy will, even so, we pray that you would bless those who hear this message today. Help each one to fully surrender their lives to the will of God, and to thee we will give the praise through Christ our Saviour. Amen

## FUNDS NEEDED FOR CAMPGROUND

Plans were made at the national business meeting in Monark Springs, Missouri on Friday, July 28, 1967 to raise funds to purchase additional land adjoining the campground if it can be bought at a reasonable price.

A number of saints in the past have desired to obtain lots on the campground and build their own cabin, but it has been difficult to do since no new lots were available.

Now this is your opportunity to make more lots available by the purchase of land which is also needed for parking space. The price on a 99-year lease for each lot is \$100. You may take several at \$100 each. The money should be sent to the secretary at once. It will then be deposited in a reliable savings account drawing interest until such time that enough is available to purchase the land.

In the event the trustees are unable to buy the new land, the money will be returned to the sender with the interest it has earned. This offer is limited until November 1st. Choice of lots will be given in the order in which the money is received. Congregations may participate in this plan and help finance several lots at \$100 each.
