"For God So Loved the World"

Radio Broadcast for week of December 17, 1967--(See back page for list of stations)

. . . A very warm welcome to all the listeners of this radio station. We are happy to be coming your way by means of radio for a short gospel broadcast. We hope you will become better acquainted with us and we with you as we enjoy the pure truths of God's word together on this weekly broadcast. So we say a cheerful greeting to all the listeners of KCRS of Midland, Texas. It is a real pleasure to be reaching into this area of the state of Texas. We hope to hear from those who listen to the broadcast there.

And then we welcome all those who are listening to KCLO from Leavenworth, Kansas. It is indeed a pleasure to be bringing to you the gospel of Christ. We are certainly happy to be reaching into the Kansas City area. We would like to know about it if you enjoy the broadcast there.

And we are extremely happy to know that this message is also being heard over radio station KXOW from Hot Springs, Arkansas. Now these are the three stations which are carrying the broadcast for the first time, and, of course, we say welcome back to all those who have been hearing it on the other stations which are familiar with our broadcast. But so much for the introduction.

As time goes on we hope you will learn to know us better. We want you to know that we print these weekly messages and mail them free of charge to those who request them. Here now is our thought for today. It is the verse of all verses found in the Bible. We might call it the golden text of the Bible. Let me read it to you. Perhaps you have heard it many times before. From John 3:16 we read, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Now in this verse is wrapped up a

great wealth of God's treasures. One of the first things we observe is the word "love". Notice that it was God's love. God, being the perfect creator as He is, we naturally expect, and rightly so, that He should have perfect love. It was this love of God that brought Christ to the world. Now at this season of the year there is much celebration taking place and all supposedly in honor of the birth of Christ. However, I am sometimes made to wonder if there are not those who are more interested in the gifts which we receive daily from God than they are in knowing and experiencing the real love of God who is the giver of all good gifts.

Listen to these verses beginning with Matthew 22:36. "Master, which is the great commandment in the law? Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." This then was the answer which Christ gave to one who wanted to know what the greatest commandment was. It is love--divine love for God first of all, and secondly, love for others.

In the 13th chapter of I Corinthians and the 13th verse we read these words, "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity." Friends, let me tell you that the greatest need in our age is that we may learn to love God more. It is then that His love will radiate from our lives and reach others.

Let us analyze love for a few moments. Perhaps you have seen a rainbow. We understand that some way light waves are broken down through moisture in the air or clouds, and the

colors are shown separately in a rainbow. There is the red, the blue, the yellow, the violet, and the orange. Even so, did you know that love is made of various ingredients.

Love is a blend of many virtues. Here are just a few: patience, kindness, generosity, unselfishness, gentleness, and sincerity. We could go on into some length discussing these but time does not permit for us to bring out the many good qualities of each virtue. But if God so loved us that He gave His son to come into this world of sorrow and endured the scoffs and scorn of those who despised him, I believe that we should learn to love God.

Now the business of our lives is to have these things fitted into our characters. That is the supreme work to which we need to address ourselves in this world--to learn love. Is not life full of opportunities to learn love? Every man and woman, every day, has many opportunities to learn this grace which is above all virtues--the love of God. The world is not a playground. It is a schoolroom. Life is not a holiday but an opportunity to learn one eternal lesson for us all--how better we can love.

What makes a man a good artist or a good musician? Practice. What makes a young lady a good stenographer? Practice. What makes a man a good man? Well, really and truly first it is to have the love of God in his heart. Next that he should practice that in his daily life. Friends, I want to give you a little motto here which I hope you will not adopt for your policy in life. Too many people already have this attitude.

Listen.

"I lived for myself, I thought for myself,
For myself, and none beside--
Just as if Jesus had never lived,
As if He had never died."

Friends, you show me a person practicing that motto, and I will show you a person who is dead spiritually. Instead let us strive daily to love him who died for us, and then go one step further and show the love of God through our lives to those who do not love us. This is life eternal.

I am not speaking of an idealistic love, but I am speaking of a realistic love; one which is active and will work for us the thing which hatred can never do. Show me a family where love is the rule of the home, and I will show you a happy home. Show me a city where love is the rule, and I will show you a city where the problems are few. Show me a nation whose God is the God of love, and I will show you a nation where the approval of God is resting and where the angels of his love are encamping about the inhabitants thereof.

Then show me a world where the gospel has gone and those who were living in hatred and sin repented and turned from their sin as did Ninevah when Jonah preached to them, and I will show you a world where there will be "peace on earth and good will toward men."

Listen to this poem.
