He Doth not Afflict Willingly - Part II

Radio Broadcast for week of August 18, 1968 (See back page for list of stations.)

. . . a very cheerful greeting to all the listeners of THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast. I am real glad to be coming your way once again by means of radio. We appreciate those who have written and told us that they have been enjoying the broadcast. Then, there are some that do not live in range of the stations over which the message is heard and yet they get the printed copies. We are glad to hear from them, too. If you are not already on the mailing list, send us your name and address and let us add it to those who get the printed copies each week. There is no charge for this service. We trust God to supply the means to keep His word going forth over the air and through the mails.

Now, last week I spoke to you about this text found in Lam. 3:31-33. "For the Lordwill not cast off for ever: But though he cause grief, yet will he have compassion according to the multitude of his mercies. For he doth not afflict willingly nor grieve the children of men." Didyou notice that it says, "The Lord doth not afflict willingly nor grieve the children of men." I take that to mean that God has a purpose for the afflictions and the trials through which he lets us go. I also gave you 3 points to remember in passing through sorrow. They consisted of the "don'ts". There are 4 more of these before we begin our constructive view concerning sorrow. Here is the next one.

4. Don't retail your sorrows. In other words, don't be so filled with your own problems and troubles that you do not have time to listen to those of others. You see, if you begin every conversation with your own sorrow and problems people will soon learn to think of you as continually being in

trouble. Whereas we should not desire them to think of the troubles which we have continually, but that God hath given us victory over our sorrow. So I would say, don't tell your troubles to everybody you meet. Find a real saint of God, if necessary, one who is well established in the truth, and seek his or her advice. Then, of course, after all, remember our saviour is the principal one to which we should go in prayer with our burdens and sorrows. He understands.

5. Don't resign yourself to sorrow and feel that it will continue. This is a very important one. I have noticed that sometimes a problem which seems to be so great today has a way of fading into insignificance by tomorrow. Then we are made to wonder why it was of such grave importance—or that is, it seemed that way to us—whereas when we look at it in the proper perspective our troubles aren't so great after all. And usually time helps to heal up our wounds. Therefore count it that way.

Plan on tomorrow being a better day. As you remove yourself further from your sorrow you are less affected by it.

6. Don't fight against a trouble directly. Now the scripture does say "Resist the devil and he will flee from you." But God does not mean for our fight with Satan or sorrow to continue indefinitely. Resist him -- yes. look up to Jesus and say as he did when he was confronted with Satan. "Get thee hence, Satan". You see, by resisting Satan and temptations we gain the victory over them. And even as we release our sorrows upon the saviour, then he has designed that we should go free because he bore them for us The final "don't" then is this one:

7. Don't complain. Now there may be some who feel that this is the hardest one to observe, but I believe if you will make a firm resolution and a commitment to God, that he can give you victory over complaining, You know once a person gets in the habit of complaining it seems to be somewhat a second nature to him. If he doesn't have things to justify his complaining he will think up some in order to live up to his nature. certainly we don't want that type of a nature. We don't want that type of a habit -- to be continually complaining. So resolve now in your heart that you are going to quite your complaining. You are going to tell your problems to the Lord and then you are going to commit them to Him and leave them there. Phil. 2:14 says, "Do all things without murmurings and disputings:" Now right there is a full time job.

Bear in mind all the while, that as you receive comfort and grace from God

you will be in a better position to comfort others who pass through the same type of sorrow and trials. Here is proof of it in the scripture which I gave on the broadcast last week. Do you remember? "Blessedbe God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort; Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God." That is found in II Cor. chapter 1 and verses 3 and 4. Listen to this poem:

Commit Thou All Thy Grief

Commit thou all thy griefs
And ways into His hands,
To His sure truth and tender care,
Who earth and heaven commands.

Who points the clouds their course, Whom winds and seas obey, He shall direct thy wandering feet, He shall prepare thy way.

Give to the winds thy fears;
Hope, and be undismayed;
God hears thy sighs, and counts thy
tears,
God shall lift up thy head.

Through waves and clouds and storms,
He gently clears thy way,
Wait thou His time; so shall this night
Soon end in joyous day.

Still heavy is thy heart?
Still sink the spirits down?
Cast off the weight, let fear depart,
And every care be gone.

What though thou rulest not? Yet heaven and earth and hell Proclaim, God sitteth on the Throne, And ruleth all things well!

Leave to His sovereign sway
To choose and to command;
So shalt thou wondering own, His
sway
How wise, how strong His hand;

Far, far above thy thought His counsel shall appear, When fully He the work hath wrought That caused thy needless fear.

Thou seest our weakness, Lord! Our hearts are known to Thee: Oh! lift Thou up the sinking hand, Confirm the feeble knee!

KGGF-Coffeyville

We believe that many of the listeners and readers of The Mission Trail will be happy to know that beginning Sunday Sept. 1 the broadcast will be heard over a very excellent station located near Coffeyville, Kan. KGGF operates on a frequency of 690 kc. with a power of 10,000 watts. Starting time for the message will be at 8 a.m. This station covers wide areas of Kansas, Okla., and parts of Missouri and Arkansas. Congregations located at Coffeyville, Anthony, Wichita, Guthrie, Oklahoma City, Shawnee, Boley, Okmulgee, Tulsa, Sapulpa, Neosho, Webb City, and any others within this area should be able to hear the broadcast without difficulty under normal con-This is indeed a step of faith but a number of congregations have agreed to regularly help finance the cost of the broadcast time, which is \$22 per week. This is more expensive than any other station on which we are now broadcasting, however we feel that the coverage will also be much better than any other single station. We appreciate those who feel the need of the gospel being proclaimed over the air and are helping to make this possible. The expense of postage for last week was \$44.54. Will you pray with us and for us that God will supply every need and we may be able to speak the word boldly? As cool weather approaches reception should be good.
