Go ye therefore, and teach all nations

Radio Broadcast for week of September 15, 1968 (See back page for list of stations.)

. . . and a cheerful greeting to all those tuned to THE MISSION TRAIL broadcast of Guthrie, Oklahoma. This is Willie Murphey coming your way once again with a message from the Word of God. We deeply appreciate those who make this weekly visit and message possible. Thank you for your co-operation and support. It is indeed a pleasure to hear from those who enjoy the messages. We sincerely desire your prayers.

In the 28th chapter of Matthew and the 19th verse we find these words, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:" I want to speak to you of the solemn duty of carrying out this command which was one of the last spoken by our Lord Jesus Christ before he ascended to His Father.

In other words we might say this has to do with missionary work. Now in speaking of the missionaries we at once think of someone crossing the ocean to carry the gospel to those beyond the borders of our own country. And that is indeed true. We need more of those who are willing to go and give their lives as a sacrifice that others may know the saving grace of our Lord.

Listen to this verse from Psalms 2:8 "Ask of me, and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." So you see, there is a need to go and teach the heathen. But wait a moment. I want to show you some thing. Do you think that all the heathen

live overseas? Now, don't misunderstand me. I know there are many overseas who need the gospel and I am wholeheartedly infavor of sending those who are qualified and have the call to go and teach them the ways of the Lord more perfectly. But here is what I want to show you -- not all unsaved and unchristianized people live over seas. Did you know that? There are quite a few of them living right around our doors. When lawlessness, rioting, drunkenness, and stealing is so prevalent among us, it is ample evidence that there is a need of the gospel. So you say you want to be a missionary? Fine! That is a good desire. I hope God may give you the desire of your heart. Then let me show you where to start. You see, this is one job where all of God's children can work. No one is excluded.

Begin first in your own home. Live and teach salvation to those of your own family. Our nation is made up of states, counties, cities, and towns. Within the towns and cities there are families and individuals. I believe our duties begin first at home. Then it should

spread to the uttermost parts of the earth. God can not use us in a greater capacity until we have been faithful in the smaller things around us. Listen to these instructions from Deut. 6, beginning with verse 4, "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God is one Lord: And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might. And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up. And thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes. And thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates."

Now, friends, let us face the facts which we have before us. Somewhere there has been a failure on the part of parents to do what they have been commanded to do. Perhaps they have been too busy with other things while the boys and girls were left unattended to go their own way. The influence of the television programs, shows, and novels have taken their toll of those families who have failed to begin this teaching in their home. Let us not forget this: missionary work begins at home. you want a tree to grow up to be a tall and straight one, don't bend the twig the wrong way.

Now listen to this scripture from Psa. 78, beginning with verse 5, "For he established a testimony in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our fathers, that they should make them known to their children: That the generation to come might know them, even the children which

should be born; who should arise and declare them to their children: That they might set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep his commandments:"

Here is another verse from Isa. 38:19, "The living, the living, he shall praise thee, as I do this day: the father to the children shall make known thy truth."

Here then is another way to be a missionary. In Matt. 5:16 we find these words: "Letyour light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." Friends, are you letting the gospel light shine through your life? If the world is going to see Christ in these days it must be through the life of His people. Don't leave it all for the preacher to do. Let your light shine and be an example wherever you live. Listen to what the writer had to say in Psalms 66:16, "Come and hear, all ye that fear God, and I will declare what he hath done for my soul. " You see, the Lord had done something for him and he was going to tell it.

And in the 40th Psalm he really did tell it. Listen beginning with verse l, "I waited patiently for the Lord; and he inclined unto me, and heard my cry. He brought me up also out of an horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings. And he hath put a new song in my mouth, even praise unto our God: many shall see it, and fear, and shall trust in the Lord."

There are many ways to be a missionary. One might visit the sick having prayer with them. Oftentimes one who is in jail or in trouble is more receptive to the truth than he was before. Many times those who

are given to the habits of drinking or narcotics are covering up something in their lives which the grace of God could remove if someone only told them of the deliverance which is possible through Christ.

It is a sure thing that those who are lying, cheating, and stealing are not happy. Listen to this scripture from Isa. 57:20 and 21, "But the wicked are like the troubled sea, when it cannot rest, whose waters cast up mire and dirt. There is no peace, saith my God, to the wicked."

We might express it in this way with the words of that well-known song by Fanny J. Crosby:

Rescue the perishing, Care for the dying,

Snatch them in pity from sin and the grave;

Weep o'er the erring one, Lift up the fallen,

Tell them of Jesus the mighty to save.

Tho they are slighting him, Still he is waiting,

Waiting thepenitent child to receive, Plead with them earnestly, Plead with them gently;

He will forgive if they only believe.

Down in the human heart, Crushed by the tempter,

Feelings lie buried that grace can restore:

Touched by a loving heart, Wakened by kindness,

Chords that were broken will vibrate once more.

Rescue the perishing, Duty demands it,

Strength for thy labor the Lord will provide;

Back to the narrow way patiently win them;

Tell the poor wand'rer a Savior has died.

Let us pray.

Our Father,

Awaken each one of thy people to the need of being workers for souls. May we first begin at home and then so faithfully spread thy word until it will reach even unto the uttermost ends of the world bringing light and salvation to the heathen everywhere. This we ask in Jesus name. Amen

Here is a couple of verses I want to leave with you. They are found in Psa. 126:5-6, "They that sow in tears shall reapin joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

Then in conclusion,

"We'll girdle the globe with salvation, And holiness unto the Lord; Till light shall illumine each nation, The light from the lamp of his word."
