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From Rags to Riches -- Part Two

Radio Broadcast for week of November 10, 1968 (See back page for list of stations.)

. . . and a very cheerful greeting to all the listeners of THE MISSION TRAIL Broadcast. We are certainly happy to be coming your way once again. We hope each of you are enjoying good health and the blessing of the Lord as the days go by. We realize that with the passing of each day we are a little nearer to our eternal home than we have ever been before. Let us redeem the time for surely it is passing from us very swiftly.

Friends, I want to share with you a part of a recent letter which I received. It says, and I quote:

"You know it seems like the days, weeks, and months just fly by nowadays. Here it will soon be Christmas and then a new year again and you know I suppose a lot of people that have been expecting sometime to be saved will find themselves still in the same condition at the end of another year. That is real pathetic, isn't it? If they could just know like we know surely it seems they wouldn't go on in their same old condition. Keep telling them, will you, and maybe some will be saved from a terrible fate because you and your family have gotten the message to them. You have our prayers." End of quote.

Now, I appreciate that letter. And I hope that the message will penetrate the hardest heart and cause some to awaken to their need of being prepared.

As a continuation from a recent broadcast listen to this text once again. "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich,

yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich. " II Cor. 8:9 Now I spoke earlier how that Christ even though he was rich became poor for our sakes, by coming to this world and taking upon him the form of a man that he might bring salvation down to us. I am reminded of that song which the saints in Bakersfield sing so well, "Salvation has been brought down". But let me show what condition Christ found the world in when he came. Beginning with Isa. 53:1 it says, "Who hath believed our report? and to whom is the arm of the Lord revealed? For he shall grow up before him as a tender plant, and as a root out of a dry ground: he hath no form nor comeliness; and when we shall see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him. He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he

was bruised for our iniquities: chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." Now doesn't that sound to you that the world was bankrupt spiritually? As for true riches goes -- they only had rags. And in fact that is what some people still have today who haven't accepted the Lord and his atonement. Let us move over a little further in the book of Isaiah and notice chapter 64 and verse 6, "But we are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags; and we all do fade as a leaf: and our iniquities, like the wind, have taken us away. " This sounds to me like the prodigal son who had wasted all his substance in riotous living and was perishing with hunger.

But you know it is rather difficult for one to receive help unless they first can see their need. When the poor boy came to himself, then he realized how much more blessed it would be in his father's house to enjoy the warmth and comfort of home than it was to have enjoyed the pleasures of sin for a season, and then, of course, be clothed in rags. Consequently he did something about it. He arose and went to his father. And that is where he traded his rags for riches. For his father sent for the best robe to be placed upon him and shoes for his feet.

Now friends, what I am talking about may not seem to apply to you. You may feel that you have plenty of this world's goods, you may have a nice home, friends, loved ones, a car and these are all nice to have. But did you know that it is possible to have all these things and still be a pauper

spiritually? Listen to this challenge which was given to the Laodicean church in the 3rd chapter of Revelations. "I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would thou wert cold or hot. So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spue thee out of my mouth. Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked: Icounsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see. As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent. Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me."

Why don't you right now trade in your rags for riches. Give up your sinful ways and self-righteousness and call upon the Lord for mercy and seek the eternál riches which will never fade Listen to this verse from Prov. 10:22. It says, "The blessing of the Lord, it maketh rich, and he addeth no sorrow with it." You see sometimes one may have a great amount of earthly riches but it often brings Often they are in fear of sorrow. someone who is going to beat them out of it. But not these true riches of Christ. Listen to this poem.
