With God All Things Are Possible

Radio Broadcast for week of February 2, 1969 (See back page for list of stations.)

. . . and a cheerful greeting to each and every listener of this radio station. We hope that you will keep your dial tuned for another message from THE MISSION TRAIL of Guthrie, Oklahoma. We are glad to be coming your way as we do each Sunday over this same station at this time. We are taught to have faith in God and if we lose our faith we cannot expect to receive very much from Him. Listen to this verse in Luke 1:37, "For with God nothing shall be impossible." Now do you believe that? You see, God being the Creator of the universe and all things therein, he certainly has the power to alter them as he sees best. Now you keep this scripture in mind as we go on. I want to speak to you about Christ's mission to the world. In other words, why did Christ come to the world? And I want to point out several things that Christ accomplished in his mission by coming the first time. Now some folks are waiting for some of these things to happen when the Lord comes the second time. But I want to remind you that the Lord did His work the first time, much of it which some folks are waiting to happen for his second coming. But listen:

1. He came to seek and to save the lost. Listen to this scripture from Luke 19:10. "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." Well, I tell you Christ came a long way when he found some of us. For we were utterly and hopelessly lost without him and of course this is no exception of the rule because that's the condition of everyone who's without Him.

2. He came to save sinners. And here is the scripture that gives us proof of it. I Tim. 1 and verse 15 we find these words, "This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners; of whom I am chief." Now I don't believe that Paul continued to be chief among sinners after he was saved

because I believe he was saved from his sins.

3. Christ came to give spiritual life. And I like this scripture in John 10:10, "The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy: I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

4. Christ came to make an end of sin. Here is the prophecy in Daniel 9:24, "Seventy weeks are determined upon thy people and upon thy holy city, to finish the transgression, and to make an end of sins, and to make reconciliation for iniquity, and to bring in everlasting righteousness, and to seal up the vision and prophecy, and to anoint the most Holy." In other words, Christ came to set up his kingdom which is a

spiritual kingdom and those who have had their sins put away from them are members of his church and his kingdom right now.

6. He came to save from sin. Matt. 1:21 tells us, "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name Jesus: for he shall save his people from their sins." Notice the scripture didn't say that he was going to save his people in their sins, but he saves his people from their sins.

7. He came to take away sin. This is shown in I John 3:5 which says, "And ye know that he was manifested to take away our sins; and in him is no sin."

8. He came to wash us from our sins. Listen to this verse in Rev. 1:5, "And from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, and the first begotten of the dead, and the prince of the kings of the earth. Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood." And let me tell you that his blood is abundantly able to wash away every stain of sin from those who come to him.

9. Christ came to give us an example of Christian living. Here it is in I Peter 2:21, 23, "For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps: Who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth: Who, when he was reviled, reviled not again; when he suffered, he threatened not; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously".

Now does all of this sound impossible? Humanly speaking--yes: to God--no. Remember the text; it says, "For with God nothing shall be impossible." You see Christ has all power. This he told

his disciples in Matt. 28:18 when he said, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth."

Now, in speaking of the power of God and protection which he offers his people, may I remind you that at one time when David Livingstone was in Africa he was in a certain place which was quite infested with lions. Some of the natives had surrounded a lion attempting to kill him and time and again the lion broke through their circle. Livingstone got tired and decided to go home. But the natives had wounded the lion which suddenly jumped from the bushes and bit Livingstone on the arm breaking the bone. Someone later asked Livingstone what he thought when the lion had hold of him and he said he was thinking what part of me he would eat first. Now even though God didn't save Livingstone in the same manner in which he did Daniel who was thrown into the lion's den, he did save him when his native helper Melbalwe came forth to rescue him. Well, it did leave Livingstone with 11 teeth marks on his arm which was crippled. But think what it would have been had not God's power been manifested through his native helper.

Then again I am reminded of Peter who was in trouble and needed the Lord's help right away. It tells about it here in the 14th chapter of Matt. You see, Jesus was walking on the water and the disciples saw him and were very much afraid. I suppose they thought it was a spirit and they were very troubled. Of course, Jesus let them know that it was he and cautioned them to be not afraid. Well, this gave Peter quite a bit of boldness so he just asked the Lord if he couldn't come to him on the water. Why, sure Jesus gave him permission to come.

So out of that ship Peter came and started for Jesus. But do you know what happened? You see the wind was blowing and waves were rolling about him and somehow or other, Peter began to notice those things. Sure enough, he began to sink. Listen to what Jesus said in verse 31, "And immediately Jesus stretched forth his hand, and caught him, and said unto him, O thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?" I am glad Jesus saved Peter, aren't you? I'm sure he was too. But it does show that with God nothing is impossible.

One scripture says, "Wherefore he is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him, seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them." Heb. 7:25 Friends, not only is the Lord able to save from sin but he is able to keep you from falling. That is what the book of Jude says in verse 24, "Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy". Then verse 25 goes on to say, "To the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen"
