Letterwriting

Radio Broadcast for week of May II, 1969 (See back page for list of stations.)

To open my message I would like to begin with the words of a letter written by the Apostle Paul to the church at Ephesus, "Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ by the will of God, to the saints which are at Ephesus, and to the faithful in Christ Jesus: Grace be to you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ". Now doesn't that sound to you like a beautiful way to begin a letter? Well, it certainly does to me. And in speaking of letters I have chosen that as our topic for the broadcast--"Letterwriting".

As strange as it may seem many folks don't like to write letters. Do you know some folks like this? Well, there are very few people indeed who do not enjoy a good letter from a close friend or relative or perhaps even from some one whom they don't know so well if it shows an interest in them. words most folks like to get letters, especially if they are good letters. We have received many many good and encouraging letters and we appreciate them. Sometimes we receive letters which are not so encouraging. These, of course, we just commit to the Lord too. And we would especially like to stress at this time the importance of letterwriting. One of the next best things to a good personal visit with a friend is a letter from that friend. Soldier boys who are far from home in a distant land look forward for 'mailtime. And no doubt many a comforting word has been a blessing to lonely hearts. In Prov. 25:25 we find these words, "As cold waters to a thirsty soul, so is good news from a far

country."

Here is another letter Paul wrote to the Philippian brethren. He said, "Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, Always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy, For your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now; Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ: Even as it is meet for me to think this of you all, because I have you in my heart; inasmuch as both in my bonds, and in the defence and confirmation of the gospel, ye all are partakers of my grace.

No doubt it was a comfort to the Apostle Paul when he would get some good news of the saints who were encouraged in the Lord. It was refreshing to him too.

You know, friends, it is not so hard

to talk of leaving all for Christ, that our strength and guide, our help in is, just as long as it is only talk. But when those words are put into action it is a little different thing. Listen to a part of this letter written by James Taylor before he left for the mission field of China. He wrote this to his mother, "I think, Mother dear, it will be well to comply with Mr. Bird's suggestion, and propose myself to the Committee. I shall await your answer, however, and rely upon your prayers. If I should be accepted to go at once, would you advise me to come home before sailing?. . . I almost think it would be easier for us not to meet, than having met, to part again forever. No, not forever!. . . It is easy to talk of leaving all for Christ, but when we come to the test, it is only as we stand complete in him we can go through with it. God bless you, my own dear, dear Mother. Can not write more, but hope to hear from you soon as possible. Pray. . . for me. " So you see some letters bring sorrow and heartache while others bring comfort and joy. But letterwriting is a means of expressing one's own self to another. I really believe that many folks miss a blessing because they don't do more letterwriting.

So let me tell you what I think we will do. I believe we will just share some of the letters with you which have been such a blessing to us. You see it is letters from our listeners and readers which inform us how the gospel message is being received both over the air and through the mail. So here is Frances to bring you some of these letters.

Here is a letter from Oklahoma:

"Greetings to all in the precious name of Jesus, our sure and firm foundation,

every time of need. I have been slow in telling you I received such a blessing from the poem, title: "At Wits' End Corner". I reread it often. Also dear Sister Jessie Taylor's testimony about the little dog. Thru this last winter it seemed as the poem said.
