Christian Baptism

Radio Broadcast for week of September 21, 1969 (See back page for list of stations.)

"And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Mark 16:15, 16 This is the message our Lord left his disciples before he went away. I believe it is still in effect and I believe that God still honors it. This is part of the word and this is Bible teaching. Now let us look into this act of baptism a little more fully in the light of the scriptures. It is a Bible doctrine. It was practiced by John the Baptist. Many were baptized by him in acknowledging the kingdom of God which John declared to them. Along with this doctrine of baptism John also emphasized the importance of repentance and bringing forth works to prove they had repented.

Furthermore, Jesus himself, the Son of God, left an example for us by the act of baptism in which he took part when he was baptized by John. Listen to this scripture beginning with Luke 3:21, "Now when all the people were baptized, it came to pass, that Jesus also being baptized, and praying, the heaven was opened, And the Holy Ghost descended in a bodily shape like a dove upon him, and a voice came from heaven, which said, Thou art my beloved Son; in thee I am well pleased. " Jesus ordained this act of baptism as a perpetual ordinance in the church. Hence the scripture which I gave you at first in the which Jesus instructed the disciples to baptize the believers. apostles also understood this act of baptism and Paul baptized his converts.

Now, perhaps many would be agreed thus far that all should be baptized, but there might be some question as to what is the proper mode of baptism. Let us go to the scriptures for our answer in this point also. Beginning with Matt. 3:4, "And the same John had his raiment of camel's hair, and a leathern girdle about his loins; and his meat was locusts and wildhoney. Then went out to him Jerusalem, and all Judaea, and all the region round about Jordan, And were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins." You see there was much water in the Jordan river. So I am convinced that both the preacher and the candidate went down into the water. This is exactly what happened when Philip baptized the eunuch. Listen, I quote, "And Philip said, If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. And he answered and said, I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. And he commanded the chariot to standstill: and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him." Acts 8:37, 28 We also read in Matt. 3:16, "And Jesus, when he was baptized, went up straightway out of the water". One could not come up out of the water

if he had not been in the water. And since baptism is a spiritual representation of a burial with Christ it seems to me that it would certainly consist of more than just sprinkling or pouring water upon one's head to fully represent a burial. And furthermore since the candidates are required to have repented of their sins and exercised faith in Christ as their saviour, I would say that infants and unconverted people are not fit subjects for Christian baptism. Now even though it is a requirement for believers to be baptized, it is through the blood of Christ that their sins are cleansed. In other words baptism is a figure of salvation and represents a death to sin and a resurrected life in Christ.

In some heathen countries and places the act of baptism seems to be one of the significant indications that the ties have been broken from the heathen worship. And often those who accept baptism are persecuted greatly.

Now, let me take you back in history well over a hundred years ago when Adonirum Judson was labouring for souls in Burma. He had arrived in Burma early in the year of 1813. And labouring for some years it was in April of 1819 when the "zayat", or the meeting house, was nearly completed and ready for service. Let me quote just a little directly from the book, "Adonirum Judson".

"Day after day Mr. Judson sat in the zayat reading aloud or repeating simple gospel truths to attract the passers-by. It mattered not if the day was sultry, or if he was weary and worn, or if his heart ached with the burden for souls, he remained faithfully at his task. Oft-times as he read he thought of his neglected study table, of his patient,

toil-worn wife, of the letters remaining unwritten, of the devotional books which his soul was starving to read, but with firm resolve he determined to let none of these lure him from the task he now deemed first of all in importance. Should he desist for one moment some seeking soul might pass by who would never pass that way again and who would lose his only opportunity of hearing the words of life.

"Nor did his labors cease with nightfall. Then he retired to his secret closet and there prayed fervently for those who had passed heedlessly by that day as well as for those who had stopped to inquire. Mr. Judson was a firm believer in the power of prayer. And he believed that the Word of God would carry conviction to the hearts of people and would there work the change necessary to make them Christians. He believed in his message and because he believed in it he did not become discouraged when he did not see immediate results.

"On Apr. 30, 1819, Moung Nau called. He was silent and reserved, quite the opposite to a visitor who had called the previous day and for whom Mr. Judson entertained bright hopes. He was less hopeful for Moung Nau; nevertheless this man returned the next day and the next and when the more promising ones had ceased to come, Moung Nau was there giving close and respectful attention to the message. In fact, he paid such good heed that on days when the visitors were numerous he was able to assist Mr. Judson in explaining things to newcomers. The grace of God seemed to be taking hold of his heart. Tho he was poor and must of necessity work every day, his visits were regular.

"On May 9 in the presence of a number

of persons he declared himself a disciple of Christ and asked for baptism. Altho he realized that the consequences of such a course meant persecution and possibly death, he thought it better to live a few days and be happy forever than to live a few days and be forever wretched. On June 27, in a lake near the zayat, Christian baptism was administered to the first Burman convert. 'Oh, may it prove the beginning of a series of baptisms in the Burman empire which shall continue in uninterrupted success to the end of time! wrote Mr. Judson in his journal that day. "

End of quote. Now, friends, don't you see what it meant to be a believer and to be baptized in Burma and do you not understand that it is a commandment of the Lord for all believers to be bap-Now it is not the water that tized. saves a person but it is the obedience which counts in the sight of God. "Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice." Have you obeyed the Lord? Are you willing to follow him all the way and keep his commandments and ordinances even though it may bring the scoffs and scorns of the world? Listen to this poem.




