Run With Patience

Radio Broadcast for week of February 1, 1970 (See back page for list of stations.)

"Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." Heb. 12:1, 2. Friends, our spiritual race is often likened unto a foot race where the runners put forth their best effort to gain the coveted prize. Sometimes the spiritual conflict is likened unto warfare where one goes out to meet his most deadly foe and indeed, we are in a warfare and we are running a race and let us not forget that we do have much opposition. The moment you give your heart and life to Christ, the moment you put God's will first in your life, from then on you may be sure you'll encounter many hindering obstacles. The only way that we will ever be successful in serving the Lord and in this Christian race is to make God's will our supreme goal in life.

Notice especially that the scripture says to run with patience the race that is set before us. This doesn't mean to run as if you were scared for a while and then take a nap by the side of the road, but it means a continual perseverance. Did you ever hear the name of Glenn Cunningham? Let me tell you just a little of Glenn. When he was only 8 years old on that cold winter morning of 1918, he and his brother were going to the school house to start the fire in the heating stove. A very tragic thing happened that morning when the kerosene that had been poured into the stove caught fire with a terrific explosion. The results: one brother, Floyd Cunningham lost his life. Even though Glenn attempted to rescue his brother his efforts failed and 5 hours later Glenn regained consciousness in his own bed with his body badly burned

from the fire. The family doctor was called who in turn sent for the specialists. As these doctors stood around the bedside and saw the pitiful condition the legs of Glenn Cunningham were in, the toes were burned from his left foot, their advice was "amputate his legs". "He'll never walk again", so they said. But young Glenn said "no" and his parents stood by his decision for him to keep his legs although they seemed worthless. Days went by. Glenn endured much pain and suffering, but his goal in life was that he would walk again. It took effort on his part. It took discipline and training and perseverance. But would you be pleased to know that one day Glenn stood on his own feet again. He struggled to walk, but he kept at it. As the days went by his strength increased. As he helped his father on the farm he was

often seen not walking but running. He watched his diet. He refrained from the drinking of coffee and the eating of too much sugar. In 1923 Glenn was 13 years old. He entered the competition for racing in his own Morton County in Kansas. And who would have thought that this boy who was supposed to have never walked again, won that race and from there he went on with that goal in life, to win in the opposition of racing. It was not one medal he won in racing, but many many trophies were given in his honor because he had started out to win.

Now, what would have been the result of this boy of 8 had he resigned himself to the advice of the doctors who said "He'll never walk again"? Perhaps he would never have walked. But he had a goal, he had a purpose, and a plan and he brought himself, even his own personal body, into subjection to accomplish that end. We, too, as the people of God have a goal before us. We have a race to run, a crown to gain, and an eternal crown that fadeth not away. Friends, let me ask you today, what is your goal in life? There's something far greater than earthly crowns to be obtained in a foot race. But in order to gain this eternal crown we must be willing to endure the hardships which we are bound to have come our way. Look at this 10th verse of the 48th chapter of Isaiah, "Behold, I have refined thee, but not with silver; I have chosen thee in the furnace of affliction." Do you have afflictions? Is the pain and suffering hard to bear? Then here in I Peter 4, verses 12 and 13, we find these words, "Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: But rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his

glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy."

So don't be alarmed if you meet opposition.

Some of God's choicest work has been done by those who were acquainted with suffering, trials, and persecutions.

Here is a good promise for you to rest on. Luke 10 and beginning with verse 17 says, "And the seventy returned again with joy, saying Lord, even the devils are subject unto us through thy name. And he said unto them, I beheld Satan as lightning fall from heaven. Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy: and nothing shall by any means hurt you." So you see, the Lord is going to stand by his people and bring them through.

Then here is another good promise in Zech. 13:9, "And I will bring the third part through the fire, and will refine them as silver is refined, and will try them as gold is tried: they shall call on my name, and I will hear them: I will say, It is my people: and they shall say, The Lord is my God."

It is the trials of life which bring out the glory of God in God's people. And don't forget that God has a purpose and a plan for your life even though he may bring you through the fire. Mal. 3:3 goes like this: "And he shall sit as a refiner and purifier of silver: and he shall purify the sons of Levi, and purge them as gold and silver, that they may offer unto the Lord an offering in righteousness." Dear ones, do you want to enjoy the peace and satisfaction and the favor of God? Are you willing for God to purge and purify your life? Then listen to this poem:

The Refiner's Fire

He sat by a furnace of sevenfold heat,
As He watched by the precious ore,
And closer He bent with a searching
gaze,
As He heated it more and more.

He knew He had ore that could stand
the test,
And He wanted the finest gold
To mold as a crown for the King to
wear,
Set with gems of a price untold.

So He laid our gold in the burning fire,
Though we fain would have said him
nay;
And He watched the dross that we had
not seen,
As it melted and passed away.

And the gold grew brighter and yet
more bright,
But our eyes were so dim with tears,
We saw but the fire--not the Master's
hand,
And questioned with anxious fears.

Yet our gold shone out with a richer
glow,
As it mirrored a Form above,
That bent o'er the fire though unseen
by us,
With looks of ineffable love.

Can we think that it pleases His loving
heart
To cause us a moment's pain?
Ah no! but He saw through the
present cross
The bliss of eternal gain.

So He waited there with watchful eye,
With a love that is strong and sure,
And His gold did not suffer a whit
more heat
Than was needed to make it pure.

Let us pray,

Our heavenly Father,

Help us to run with patience the race
that is set before us. May we ever
realize that the ultimate goal in our
lives is to fulfill thy will and plan for
us. Bless each listener of the broad-
cast today. Give them strength for the
trials, grace to resist temptations, and
the courage to stand for the truth for
we ask it in Jesus' name. Amen
