## *The Goodness and Severity of God - - Part 1*

Radio Broadcast for week of February 22, 1970 (See back page for list of stations.)

Good morning, friends. It is a pleasure to be coming your way again. I am glad that we have the everlasting word of God to bring you. You know, the scriptures say heaven and earth shall pass away but my word shall not pass away. And again there is a verse which says thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my pathway. So that is what we have to bring you today. Our God is a god of love and yet he is one of justice and severity. Listen to this verse, "Behold therefore the goodness and severity of God: on them which fell, severity; but toward thee, goodness, if thou continue in his goodness: otherwise thou also shalt be cut off." Romans 11:22

First, then let us consider the goodness and mercy of God. Has the Lord been merciful to you? Perhaps you can think back on your life of times when God's mercy was shown and he answered prayer for you. Psalms 52 and verse 8 and 9 goes like this, "But I am like a green olive tree in the house of God: I trust in the mercy of God for ever and ever. I will praise thee for ever, because thou hast done it: and I will wait on thy name; for it is good before thy saints." And then in Psalms 119 and verse 64 it says, "The earth, O Lord, is full of thy mercy: teach me thy statutes."

In speaking of the mercy of God listen to this verse from Psalms 107:21, "Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men!" Then going on down and beginning with verse 27 we find these words, "They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken man, and are at their wit's end. Then they cry unto the Lord in their trouble, and

he bringeth them out of their distresses. He maketh the storm a calm, so that the waves thereof are still. Then are they glad because they be quiet; so he bringeth them unto their desired haven." . . .

Now remember we are speaking about the mercy of God. Psalms 108 and verse 4 says, "For thy mercy is great above the heavens: and thy truth reacheth unto the clouds." And in I Peter 1 and 3 we find these words, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which according to his abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead". And again in Eph. 2:4, "But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love where-with he loved us".

Do you know something? All the mercy and blessings which we get come from God. There is a verse which says, "Every good and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the



Father of lights, with whom is no variableness neither shadow of turning." And this 3rd verse of the first chapter of II Cor. is real good too. It says, "Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort".

Well, someone might want to know if God is all that merciful how does he manifest his mercy to us? Now, let me show you. He does it in many ways.

In Psa. 130 and verse 7 and 8 it says, "Let Israel hope in the Lord: for with the Lord there is mercy, and with him is plenteous redemption. And he shall redeem Israel from all his iniquities." Did you know that the Lord gives every one of us life and breath? In Acts 17: 25 the Apostle Paul tells us so. He says, "Neither is worshipped with men's hands, as though he needed anything, seeing he giveth to all life, and breath, and all things". And Jesus declared how God was concerned about us in Matt. 6 and beginning with verse 25, "Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment? Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are ye not much better than they?" and then he goes on to mention the lilies of the field and that even Solomon was not arrayed like one of these. But I would say one of the high points of his thoughts presented in this chapter is brought out in verse 33 when he said, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

snow;  
We're drinking at that crystal stream  
Where life and peace and glory flow.

Shall we spend a moment in prayer,

Our father which art in heaven,  
We acknowledge thee as the giver of



all good gifts. We are grateful for thy words and for the knowledge of salvation brought to us by the word and by the spirit. Bless each listener of the broadcast today with a very special blessing in the way which they need most. Keep us for thyself alone and to thee we will give the praise through Christ our Lord. Amen
