Honesty Part 2

Radio Broadcast for week of November 22, 1970 (See back page for list of stations.)

Good morning, friends. I am happy to be coming your way once again with a message from the word of the Lord. If there was ever a time that we need to stand for the truth, it is now. Those of you who heard the broadcast last week may remember that I spoke about "honesty" and of course "dishonesty". One is opposite to the other. So to begin with let me give you again this scripture from II Cor. 8:21, "Providing for honest things, not only in the sight of the Lord, but also in the sight of men." Think how much it would be worth to children and young people in our day to have the principles of truth and righteousness instilled in their hearts while they are yet young. If one is allowed to practice lying, stealing, and cheating in their youth think what the final outcome will be. These things often develop into greater sins of embezzlement, bank robbing, and automobile stealing as well as a host of others.

I am quite sure that most people who make a purchase want to get full measure. I knew a certain merchant who operated a grocery store some years ago, the title of which was known as "the Golden Rule" grocery store. Isn't that an appropriate title? Furthermore as a standard of practice the slogan was "Where 16 ozs. make a pound". I am sure that if everyone operated on this basis there would be more mutual trust and confidence among all mankind.

Even the business people of the world appreciate a man or woman who is honest in the payment of his obligations. Then how much more so is God looking for folks who will render unto him that which rightfully is due unto God.

Think of this. Would you want a merchant to have 2 sets of scales, one of which he used in buying and another he used in selling? No, I am sure that

most of us would want him to buy and sell with the same set of scales. Then look what Jesus said in Luke 6 beginning with verse 37, "Judge not, and ye shall not be judged: condemn not, and ye shall not be condemned: forgive, and ye shall be forgiven: Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again." If this is true in the material things, and I believe it is, how much more so is it true in the things of God. We should be willing to be judged by the same standard of judgment which we place upon others.

I can remember how my father would make his living when I was but a child at home in the state of Louisiana. He would plant his English peas early in the year. He grew green beans, to-

matoes, okra, turnips, and various other vegetables to sell. He would get up early in the morning, gather the vegetables, often washing them, and tying them into bundles and get them ready to sell that day. Most people like to have fresh homegrown vegetables to serve on their tables and my father tried hard to please those who purchased these things from him. One thing especially I believe they liked was the way in which he measured them. He believed in this scripture, "good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over". Now who is it that wouldn't like to receive this sort of measure?

Don't you know that if we give ourselves wholly to the Lord without reserve and we give of our time, our money, and our efforts and along with all of this we are honest before God and honest with our fellowmen, God takes notice of this? Surely there comes a reaping day in our lives.

Listen to this scripture, "The wicked borroweth, and payeth not again: but the righteous sheweth mercy, and giveth, For such as be blessed of him shall inherit the earth; and they that be cursed of him shall be cut off. The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord: and he delighteth in his way. Though he fall, he shall not be utterly cast down: for the Lord upholdeth him with his hand. I have been young, and now am old; yet have I not seen the righteous forsaken, nor his seed begging bread. He is ever merciful, and lendeth; and his seed is blessed. Depart from evil, and do good; and dwell for evermore. For the Lord loveth judgment, and forsaketh not his saints; they are preserved for ever; but the seed of the wicked shall be cut off." Psa. 37:21-28

A few nights ago in the revival meeting at Anthony, Kan. Bro. Kenneth Probst was preaching and he read this scripture from Jer. 5 and beginning with verse 1, "Run ye to and fro through the streets of Jerusalem, and see now, and know, and seek in the broad places thereof, if ye can find a man, if there be any that executeth judgment, that seeketh the truth; and I will pardon it." I want you to hear some of the comments which Bro. Kenneth Probst made in his own words that night in Anthony, Kansas. I am sorry that the recording is not a little better, but bear in mind that this was made on my small cassette recorder. Here is what he said:

"Now, this instruction was given back under the old dispensation, but I feel like it is very applicable in this day and age for every one of us. It's a good thing as we go through life's journey to set our eyes and set our attention upon the prospects of finding somebody that's interested in the truth of God's Word. This said, "go ye to and fro", just wander about in the city and see if you can find a man. But not just any man. There is a lot of men, a lot of people. But this man is going to have to be a particular man. He is going to have to be a man that stands out from the rest of the crowd. I want you to look for a man that is peculiar in this respect. I want you to look and see if you can find that man that executeth judgment, a man that will be willing to stand upon the judgments of God's word, a man that is willing to take the Word of God as the judgment for his life. I want you to see the Lord is no doubt saying to the prophet here, "If you can find an individual whose judgment coincides with my judgment, whose understanding and whose heart is perfect before me." And he said, "See if there be a man that seeketh the

truth". Now I'm persuaded that when we start to narrow down the category we may find a lot of people that will say, "Yes, I'll take God's judgment", but when it comes right down to the truth of God's judgment, then sometimes that brings a little separation between the classes of people. God wants you and I to have such a love and such a desire and such a hungriyng in our heart for the truth that we will not stop short until we have been convinced in our own mind through the Spirit of God, backed up by the Word of God, that we have been enlightened with all the truth of God's word."

I like that, don't you? I trust the Lord will give everyone of us a constant love for the truth. Now, may I give you just a little advice. If you've been crooked in your dealings, if you have cheated or robbed, confess that thing before God, ask his forgiveness and make it right with the one whom you have wronged. I believe that God's word teaches restitution. Pay up the old grocery bill and walk honestly before God and men. Listen to this poem:

Be True

Young friends, to whom life's early days
Are bright with promise all,
And to whose view the glowing rays
Of hope unclouded fall, --
To counsel each to choose the good
Throughout the coming years, I would
A precept give to you:
Observe if you success would win
The wealth of worth embodied in
Two little words: Be true.

Be true to right: let justice still
Her even balance claim;
Unawed, unbribed, through good or ill,
Make rectitude your aim.

Unswayed by prejudice, thy mind
Each day submitted claims will find
To champion or deny;
Then, cast, according to thy light,
Thy influence on the side of right,
Though all the world goes by.

Be true to self-respect: the world
May judge thy motives wrong,
And slander's poisoned shafts be hurled
Where virtue moves along;
Keep thou the upright ways that find
The approval of thy own good mind--
"To thine own self be true";
So shalt thou humbly walk erect.
And, conscious of thy own respect,
Make others' honor due.

Our Father in heaven,

Bless the words of the message to every good and honest heart. Convict those who have been unfair and unjust. Bring them to repentance and cause them to make their wrongs right. Help us all to walk uprightly before thee and thine shall be the praise through Christ our Lord. Amen

He will cleanse your heart and make it pure,

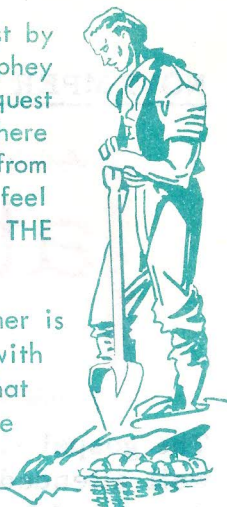
That you may enter Heaven's door.
