A Door-Mat for Christ

Radio Broadcast for week of December 13, 1970 (See back page for list of stations.)

"Then came to him the mother of Zebedee's children with her sons, worshipping him, and desiring a certain thing of him. And he said unto her, What wilt thou? She saith unto him, Grant that these my two sons may sit, the one on thy right hand, and the other on the left, in thy kingdom. But Jesus answered and said, Ye know not what ye ask. Are ye able to drink of the cup that I shall drink of, and to be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with? They say unto him, We are able. And he saith unto them, Ye shall drink indeed of my cup, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with: but to sit on my right hand, and on my left, is not mine to give, but it shall be given to them for whom it is prepared of my Father. And when the ten heard it, they were moved with indignation against the two brethren." Matt. 20:20-24

Good morning, friends. I hope that things have been going well for you this past week. I am glad to be coming your way once again by means of radio for a few moments of spiritual meditation from the scriptures. I have a subject which is somewhat unique. I have chosen to call the title of it, "A door mat for Christ". Now, you know what a door mat is, don't you? There are several different kinds of door mats. Some are made of rubber while others are made of fibrous material such as hemp or burlap, and some doormats are even made from the caps of soda pop bottles. They are just scraper type affairs. But all of these serve one useful purpose. Do you know what that purpose is? It is for the folks who enter that house to scrape and clean their feet on. And indeed this is a useful purpose which a door mat serves. It would be a lot better to have the mud scraped off outside the door, wouldn't it? Than it would be

to take it inside on the carpet or on the waxed or polished floor?

But let us go back to the scriptures. This mother was very interested in seeing her sons promoted to respectable places of honor. I suppose this is only natural for a parent. It may be that even her sons, James and John, were interested in this promotion also. In fact I am quite sure that they were because in the 10th chapter of Mark and the 35th verse it says, "And James and John, the sons of Zebedee, come unto him, saying, Master, we would that thou shouldest do for us whatsoever we shall desire." So let us not accuse the mother of the sole responsibility of this request. These boys were interested in having a place of honor in the kingdom of God, too. Jesus asked them if they would be able to go through with the things that he was facing. This no doubt was a reference to the cup of suffering and death which he should die.

Well, these disciples said yes, we are able for that. Then do you remember what the Lord told them, "And he saith unto them, Ye shall drink indeed of my cup, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with: but to sit on my right hand, and on my left, is not mine to give, but it shall be given to them for whom it is prepared of my Father." Matt. 20:23 So God was indeed going to call upon James and John to suffer for him. But Jesus let them know that this place of honor would be selected by his father only.

Then Jesus went on to give them the key of understanding as to how one is to gain favor in the sight of God. Let us get it here from the Word. Beginning with verse 25, "But Jesus called them unto him, and said, Ye know that the princes of the Gentiles exercise dominion over them, and they that are great exercise authority upon them. But it shall not be so among you: but whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister; And whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant: Even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many." Now, Jesus didn't say so in so many words, but he sure brought out the thought of how one is to be used, even as a door mat, didn't he? He said he didn't come to be ministered unto but to minister and give his life a ransom for many. Christ was numbered with the transgressors. It was outside the city of Jerusalem where he suffered and died on the cross of Calvary. It was not in the warmth and cheer of the city, but it was out there on a bleak barren hillside, which was called the place of a skull. Some of the folks who saw him on the cross ridiculed him. They said "save thyself". Well, now the simple truth of it is,

Christ saved others but he could not have done so if he had saved himself.

There are many today who are willing to sit in the seat of honor, but where are those consecrated, dedicated laborers for Christ who are willing to be a door mat for him? Do you remember what John the Baptist said in reference to Christ? He said, "Whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose". That was certainly an humble attitude he took, wasn't it? Now listen to this observation which Christ made, "And he put forth a parable to those which were bidden, when he marked how they chose out of the chief rooms; saying unto them, When thou art bidden of any man to a wedding, sit not down in the highest room; lest a more honorable man than thou be bidden of him; And he that bade thee and him come and say to thee, Give this man place; and thou begin with shame to take the lowest room. But when thou art bidden, go and sit down in the lowest room; that when he that bade thee cometh, he may say unto thee, Friend, go up higher: Then shalt thou have worship in the presence of them that sit at meat with thee. For whosoever exalteth himself shall be abased; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted." Luke 14:7-11 Now, dear ones, I believe that God has a place for every one of his children. The scriptures teach us that God sets the members in the body as it pleases him. The thing for you to do is this: Find out what God has called you to do, and then do that job for him. Don't be affected one way or the other by the criticism, condemnation, or scoffs, either from the world or professors. Then don't let any praise of men, honor or glory, cause you to swerve from your duty and devotion to God. Just be willing for God to use you in any way that he chooses and I

believe that your life will be useful. You may have a lowly calling, but if you are faithful in the little things, God is faithful to remember you in the greater things. Now, listen to this poem:

A DOOR MAT

We can not all be corner-stones,
Or panels on the door,
Or pillars; for there needs must be
A door-mat on the floor.

It's easy, when we need a light
Or dainty little vase,
To find some one who says he's
"called
To fill that very place. "

It's nice to be a sculpture-piece
That's noticed by the score,
But who is ready to be wiped
By feet, outside the door?

Some people are as true as steel!
When position keeps them there,
But who's as true when duty calls
To take a lower chair?

And others wish to rise and shine
With laurels by the score,
But these must first consent to be
A door-mat on the floor.

And those who make a door-mat true
Will rise to higher graces;
God has his honors for the few
Who will not choose their places.

Let us pray,

O Lord, our Heavenly Father,
We give ourselves to thee to be used
in whatever manner you shall choose.
Keep within us always a willing heart,
and as each of thy children fulfill the
lowly place to which you have called

them, give them grace sufficient for
every need. Bless each listener of the
broadcast this day in a special way and
thine shall be the praise through Christ
our Lord. Amen
