## "Faint Not"

Radio Broadcast for week of July 11, 1971 (See back page for list of stations.)

Good morning, friends. It is indeed a real privilege to be coming your way another time. Many thanks to each of you who have made it possible for us to bring you this weekly broadcast. I am certainly indebted to the Lord and to you. I believe that in times like these we need encouragement one from another. I know that I need encouragement and I believe that many others do too. So I am glad to have a little part in encouraging you to hold fast to God's promises in these days of trouble and perplexity.

Listen to this verse, "If thou faint in the day of adversity, thy strength is small." Prov. 24:10 Now think for just a moment. You know what it is to faint, don't you? Sometimes folks who are ever so strong and husky have I may not be able occasion to faint. to explain all that happens, but it seems that certain things affect different Sometimes when one stands in the warm sunshine too long they just faint and fall over. I remember when Kathleen and I made a trip to Quito, Ecuador in South America a couple of years ago. Down there the altitude is very high. In many places it is 9,000 feet or more. Shortly after we arrived there that day in June of 1969 we went to the grocery store with a friend. We walked through the narrowaisles looking at the groceries. Our friend, Pat Muse, pointed out some banana chips, among other things, of course. Well, Kathleen already was beginning to feel the effects of the altitude and the temperature. After that she lingered further and further behind us and felt a real sickening and fainting sensation. realized at once that she needed to be

outside the building and in the fresh air. So she headed for the door. attempted to assist her. But we found ourselves trying to leave the building from a door which was made for entrance only. Shortly others within the store realized that we were in trouble and began to point the way for us to leave the building. This we didrather hastily. Fortunately for us, Kathleen did not completely collapse, but she rested in the car after leaving the building and before long was feeling all right. Pat made the remark later that she had looked at Kathleen and thought she had "lost her". I suppose she could tell by the color of her face that she was about ready to faint. Now, remember this, it matters not how strong a person may be, if he faints he is unable to cope with the problem before him. This is true either physically or spiritually. Sometimes strong men just faint and fall over like dead. They may be ever so husky but their strength does them little good if they faint.

Dear ones, don't you know the devil is

doing what he can these days to discourage people? If one gives way to discouragement and despair in the day of adversity, or in time of trial or temptation, then he loses out. In times of trial we should endeavor to be doubly courageous. When a man loses his courage his strength avails him nothing. So let us not give up. In the time of trial and temptation, let us not lose out but let us hold fast to the promises of God remembering that he has promised to never leave us nor forsake us.

Now listen to this scripture, "If thou hast run with the footmen, and they have wearied thee, then how canst thou contend with horses? and if in the land of peace, wherein thou trustedst, they wearied thee, then how wilt thou do in the swelling of Jordan?" Jer. 12:5 Dear ones, Ibelieve the time has come for God's people to be strong in the Lordand in the power of his might. It is time for us to put on the whole armour of God that we may be able to standagainst the wiles of the devil. If the smallest of evils to which we are exposed cause us to make so many bitter complaints, then what are we going to do when we are exposed to more powerful enemies and greater persecution? Let us not think for a moment that we are going to heaven on flowery beds of ease. The Lord did not design it that way. Far be it from us to think that we can do that. But I believe that greater tribulations are yet to come. "Footmen" here may well represent just little common evil events, or we might say everyday trials and tribulations. But as the forces of evil combine and the pagan powers are revived again you may be sure that God's church is going to suffer persecution. If you sink under small difficulties then what are you going to do when the great ones come?

I understand that this Jordan River, when it overflowed, in the time of harvest drove the lions and other beasts from their hiding places among the bushes that lined its banks. Just think of the havoc and destruction these wild beasts would bring about as they roamed the countryside preying on men and cattle, and of course other livestock.

But there is one encouraging thing about trials and tribulations. If we overcome we are made stronger. We are more fortified for the next ones which are coming. You see, tribulation worketh patience and patience experience and experience hope and hope maketh not ashamed because the love of God is shed abroad within our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given to us. So as we overcome the small problems the Lord will then allow greater ones to come. But we will be more fortified through the power of God to overcome them too. If we grow careless, then it is possible for even the smallest things to cause us to stumble and fall. Remember the text, "If thou faintest in the day of adversity, thy strength is small." Listen to this poem:

You may have the strength of the warrior

For the duties of every day, And ride on the breast of the Jordan, If only you fight by the way.

Sigh not for the swift-running horses, When footmen have left you behind. If you shrink from the still, shallow water,

Small strength for the Jordan you'll find:

Gird on the armor, be sober, Trust Jesus alone for your grace; Let him hear no more of your sighings, Be content with the humblest place.

Once again we ask that you would bless the message as it goes out over the airwaves. May it be a source of inspiration and strength to that one who is almost ready to faint in the time of trial or adversity. Strengthen each one of us to press the battle on and thine shall be the praise through Christ our Lord. Amen
