"Does It Really Matter?"

Radio Broadcast for week of January 16, 1972 (See back page for list of stations)

"Behold I say unto you, lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest." It is indeed a pleasure to be coming your way once again. I am deeply indebted to God and to many of you who help to make this work of faith possible. May your reward be great in heaven and may you find many blessings right here in this life for all the sacrifice you have put forth. Did you ever hear the expression: "Oh, it doesn't really matter"? Well, I want to talk about somethings that do matter. Too many times things which are of great importance are passed over with a shrug, so to speak, and the statement, "Oh, it doesn't really matter!" Listen to this scripture and then decide if things really matter with the Lord:

"And even as they did not like to retain God in their knowledge, God gave them over to a reprobate mind, to do those things which are not convenient: Being filled with all unrighteousness, fornication, wickedness, covetousness, maliciousness; full of envy, murder, debate, deceit, malignity; whisperers, Backbiters, haters of God, despiteful, proud, boasters, inventors of evil things, disobedient to parents, Without understanding, covenantbreakers, without natural affection, implacable, unmerciful: Who knowing the judgment of God, that they which commit such things are worthy of death, not only do the same, but have pleasure in them that do them." Rom. 1:28-32. Out of that list of evil things, friends, which one of them would you say doesn't really matter in the sight of God?

Now, here is what I want to do. I would like to go back to some of John Bunyan's writings and quote from, "Life and Death of Mr. Badman" Listen, I quote:

". . . The question is not what men do believe concerning their sin, but what God's word says to it. If God's word says that swearing and cursing are sins, though men should count them for virtues, their reward will be a reward for sin--to wit, the damnation of the soul.

To curse another and to swear vainly and falsely are sins against the light of nature. 1. To curse is so, because whoso curseth another knows that at the same time he would not be so served himself. 2. To swear also is a sin against the same law, for nature will tell me that I should not lie, and therefore much less swear to confirm it. Yea, the heathens have looked upon swearing to be a solemn ordinance of God, and therefore not to be lightly or vainly used by men, though to confirm a matter of truth.

. . . But I wonder, since cursing and swearing are such evils in the eyes of God, that he doth not make some ex-

amples to others for their committing such wickedness.

... Alas! so he has a thousand times twice told, as may be easily gathered by any observing people in every age and country. I could present you with several myself, but waiving the abundance that might be mentioned, I will here present you with two: One was dreadful judgment of God upon one N. P. at Wimbledon, in Surrey, who, after a horrible fit of swearing at and cursing of some person that did not please him, suddenly fell sick and in a little time died, raving, cursing, and swearing.

But, above all, take that dreadful story of Dorothy Mately, an inhabitant of Ashover in the county of Derby.

This Dorothy Mately, said the relater, was noted by the people of the town to be a great swearer, and curser, and liar, and thief, (just like Mr. Badman;) and the labour that she usually did follow was to wash the rubbish that come forth of the lead mines, and there get sparks of lead ore; and her usual way of asserting of things was with these kind of imprecations: I would I might sink into the earth if it be not so, or I would God would make the earth open and swallow me up. Now upon the 23d of March, 1660, this Dorothy was washing of ore upon the top of a steep hill, about a quarter of a mile from Ashover, and was there taxed by a lad for taking of two single pence out of his pocket. . . but she violently deniedit, wishing that the ground might swallow her up if she had them. She also used the same wicked words on several other occasions that day.

Now, one George Hodgkinson of Ashover, a man of good report there, came accidentally by where this Dorothy was, and

stood still a while to talk with her as she was washing her ore; there stood also a little child by her tubside, and another a distance from her, calling aloud to her to come away; wherefore the George took the girl by the hand to lead her away to her that called her; but behold, they had not gone above ten vards from Dorothy but they heardher crying out for help; so, looking back, he saw the woman and her tub and sieve twirling round and sinking into the ground, Then said the man, Pray to God to pardon thy sins, for thou art never like to be seen alive any longer. So she and her tub twirled round and round, till they sunk about three yards into the earth, and then for awhile stayed. Then she called for help again, thinking, as she said, that she should stay there. Now the man, though greatly amazed, did begin to think which way to help her; but immediately a great stone, which appeared in the earth, fell upon her head and broke her skull and then the earth fell in upon her and covered her. She was afterwards digged up, and found about four yards within ground, with the boy's two single pence in her pocket, but her tub and sieve could not be found." End of quote. Now, friends, whether these illustrations were true or only allegories, which John Bunyan has used in His "Life and Death of Mr. Badman" are not the important parts of the story. But the thought is this: Things which are evil do matter in the sight of God. The scriptures themselves tell different occasions when God sent his judgment Jesus spoke about upon the people. folks--eighteen people I believe it was, upon which a tower fell and he brought out the thought that these people were not necessarily the most wicked people just because they suffered these things, So let us remember, dear ones, that God is concerned about how we live and especially is this true of folks who are

so wicked and so evil. They say things, they do things, they think things which are not right and pleasing in the sight of God. I want to tell you that God is concerned about these things. They are wrong. If people sow to the flesh they are going to reap corruption. Friends, let us have a continual prayer in our heart, that we may be delivered from temptation and from evil through prayer and supplication before the Lord.

Have you no words? Ah, think again! Words flow apace when you complain, And fill your fellow creature's ear With the sad tale of all your care.

Were half the breath thus vainly spent To heaven in supplication sent, Your cheerful song would oftener be, "Hear what the Lord hath done for me." And friends, do you know of anything more fitting for us to do just now than to pray?

Our father, bless this broadcast to the good of every listener. And as they lift their petitions to thee in earnest prayer, hear them from heaven. Send deliverance, give victory. Those who may be downcast or stricken with trouble and problems, we pray that you would bless them today. Comfort their hearts. May they find the peace that comes only through committing their all to thee and thine shall be the praise through Christ our Lord, Amen.


