"Ye Are not Your Own"

Broadcast June 23, 1985

A cheerful good morning to every listener. What a pleasure it is to be coming your way again by means of radio. Many thanks to every one of you who have helped to make this possible from week to week. I am indebted to you. I hope I shall be able to pay that debt to you and also the debt I owe to the One who has called me into this ministry. What a privilege it is to proclaim His word over the air waves to the shut-ins, the sick and those unable to lead an active life. Then there are those who do lead active lives, but take time to listen to the broadcast. I appreciate it. God bless every one of you.

And now this scripture, "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." 1 Cor. 6:19-20. A person doesn't like to admit he is not his own. He wants to be free to do as he pleases and to be let alone. Especially is this true in the earlier years of life. As one grows older they realize that freedom has its responsibilities as well as its privileges. Every one of us have an obligation. Think of the care our parents and others have invested in us as infants when we were unable to care for ourselves. It is often said that no one pays for his own raising until they have children of their own to raise. That's the substance of it anyway.

Well, let us say it this way, at least one learns what it is all about to a greater extent when they have the responsibility of their own children.

Think of the obligation we have to those who have brought us the truth. Where would be be if there had not been those who were willing to suffer and even die for the stand of the truth? The book of Hebrews in speaking of those who suffered, put it this way: "And others had trial of cruel mockings and scourgings, yea, moreover of bonds and imprisonment: They were stoned, they were sawn asunder, were tempted, were slain with the sword: they wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins; being destitute, afflicted, tormented; (of whom the world was not worthy:) they wandered in deserts, and in mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth." Hebrews 11:36-38. Wouldn't you say we were obligated to them? I would!

Not one of us can rightfully say as we go out the door in a morning, "I am free to do as I please." Why? Because we are under obligation to God and to others. Remember that text: "Ye are not your own". How true that is.

There is one thing we do have a choice in—that is which yoke we shall put on. We can be under bondage to Satan and do his bidding which many folks are. That is what I really call slavery. Or we can do what Jesus said: "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Matt. 11:28-30.

We are wise when we discover that there is one form of subordination which is better than being free to go our own way—that is the subordination to love. You might say it is a lost freedom, but a duty of love is not slavery. Submission to the love of God and His will is the attitude which sets the man free who lives it out.

Former president Woodrow Wilson, is credited with the statement: "Only free peoples can hold their purpose and their honor steady to a common end, and prefer the interests of mankind to any narrow interest of their own." That is exactly the course Jesus took when he prayed: "O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me, nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt." Matt. 26:39.

To those who think they can live in sin and still be free let me remind you of this scripture: "For when they speak great swelling words of vanity, they allure through the lusts of the flesh, through much wantonness, those that were clean escaped from them who live in error. While they promise them liberty, they themselves are the servants of corruption: for of whom a man is overcome, of the same is he brought in bondage." 2 Peter 2: 18 - 19. Now dear

ones, do you want that sort of a bond-age? I don't. I would much rather be the servant of the Lord and recognize that I am not my own, but I am bought with a price—the price of Calvary.

To further bring out this point of not belonging to ourselves, let me present this scripture to you: "For the love of Christ constraineth us; because we thus judge, that if one died for all, were all dead: And that he died for all that they which live should henceforth live unto themselves, but unto him which died for them, and rose again." 2 Cor. 5:14-15. Now just what does "constrain" mean? Glance at use in the New Testament for the answer. The crowd "thronged" Jesus. soldiers came and "took" Jesus. A woman was sick with a great "fever." In each case the crowd used is a form of our "constraineth" here. Paul is saying that the love of Jesus is like a crowd that sweeps a man off his feet; like a band of soldiers no individual can resist; like a fever in which a man is no longer master of himself. What he really says in effect is: "I let Christ's love have its way with me."

Dear ones, do you realize you are not your own, but you are bought with a price? Listen to this poem:

I asked the Lord to let me do
Some mighty work for him;
To fight amidst his battle hosts,
Then sing the victor's hymn;
I longed for ardent love to show,
But Jesus would mot have it so.

He placed me in a quiet home, Whose life was calm and still, And gave me little things to do My daily round to fill; I could not think it good to be Just put aside so silently.

Small duties gathered round my way;
Them seemed of earth alone.

I, who had longed for conquest bright
To lay before his throne,
Had common things to do and bear,

So as I thought my prayer unheard, I asked the Lord once more
That he would give me work for him,
And open wide the door-Forgetting that my Master knew
Just what was best for me to do.

Then quietly the answer came,
"My child, I hear thy cry,
Think not that mighty deeds alone
Will bring the victory;
The battle has been planned by me;
Let daily life thy conquests see."

Let us pray. Our Father, we are glad you have purchased us for thine own. Now help us to fully understand we are not our own. May we be willing to give of ourselves that others also may have the knowledge of the truth. Bless each listener of the broadcast in a very special way according to their needs.

And may the truth find receptive hearts where it can spring up and grow, bringing forth fruit to thine own glory and thine shall be the praise through Christ. Amen.

HOW TO MEET HARD THINGS!

Jesus said that in this world we would have tribulation (John 16:33) which means that we would have hard things to meet after we become true followers of Him. Satan the prince of this world, will use everything over which he has any power to annoy and oppress us. uses people who are not true saints, and sometimes in their early Christian life he can even use them. Jesus tells us to fear not, for He has overcome the world--which means that He will give us victory over every hard thing we have to meet, especially if we meet it according to the plan that He gives the Scriptures. God uses the hard things that people say and do to us perfect our Christian characters, if we meet it rightly. This thought brought out in Hebrews 12:11, where we are told that "no chastening for the seemeth to be joyous, present but grievious: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby."

God's plan for meeting the hard things that people do to us is to not resent it nor touch it at all by our efforts, but to turn the whole matter over to deal with. "For this is thankworthy, if a man for conscience toward God endure grief, suffering wrongfully. For what glory is it, if, when ye be buffeted for your faults, ye shall take it patiently? but if, when ye do well, and suffer for it, ye take it patiently, this is acceptable with God. For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps: Who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth: Who, when he was reviled, reviled not again; when he suffered, he threatened

not; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously: Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed. For ye were as sheep going astray; but are now returned unto the Shepherd and Bishop of your souls." 1 Pet. 2:19-25.

He says it is worthy of thanks from God if we "endure grief, suffering wrongfully," and take it patiently. And this is the very pathway we are called upon to walk in. It is the same path which Jesus trod. Paul says in Romans, that we are not to avenge ourselves, but to get out of the way and let God deal with the matter, "For it is written, vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord."

We are to be clothed with humility, that is, with a disposition to suffer what is said and done to us in patience leaving our wrongs in the hands of the righteous Judge. If we thus humble ourselves under the mighty hand of God, He will exalt us in due time. All our care about it is to be cast on Him, which will enable us to prove that "He careth for us."

We are to have the same disposition toward bearing the evil things that done to us that He had. obedient in this line of without resentment or one effort to right His wrongs; and even died on the cross without a word of resentment. we are to be obedient in the same way, God Himself will work in us, "both to will and to do of His good pleasure;" and we can shine as true lights in the world, and be the true Sons of God, without rebuke, in the midst of all the sin, sorrow and suffering around us. This is real victory through Christ.

"Think on These Things"

God wants us to learn to walk by faith, not by sight. Paul said, "We look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen." Faith sees the things invisible. Moses "endured, as seeing him who is invisible," and thereby had respect unto the recompense of reward. We see the same in the patriarchs and prophets who were able to bear all things, visible, enduring all that their cruel enemies could heap upon them. They had a decision that carried them through everything, for their faith saw not only the promises, but also the One who had promised.

Faith does not need any visible results for its reward, it can afford to leave all the results with the One who has promised, and go on its way rejoicing, knowing that there can be no failure in its efforts.

Sometimes when found in error we are disposed to let ourselves down easy, excusing ourselves for what has occurred, and justifying ourselves in it all. We must not be afraid to let ourselves down hard, for only in this way will we get the real benefit. If we let ourselves down right the Lord will not have to let us down. If we humble ourselves the Lord will not have to humble us. There is a great blessing in self-humiliation and it is the much easier way of getting the benefits of our mistakes.

It is not well to be too careful to spare ourselves; some need to be more careful to sacrifice themselves. Let us choose to suffer for Jesus' sake and the welfare of his cause. When weary we can find rest in him.

Zion has been redeemed with judgment, and it is by the same judgment that she will be kept pure. It was because of the lack of judgment that the church went into apostasy, or rather, that the apostasy was imposed upon the church. As the judgments of the Word of God are kept the church will be kept free from Babylon.

It is by the Word of God that the truth has come to us on the subject of justification, sanctification, healing, unity, and every other precious truth that has distinguished the true Church from those who teach the doctrines of men.

In order to be able to understand the word of God properly, it is necessary that we do not pervert it in any respect. Should we do so, it would cause us to misunderstand it in other respects.

Some people accept and teach a doctrine that requires them to misconstrue the Word of God so they can fit it to their doctrine. It is so much better to fit every doctrine to the Word of God.

We all want joy in our Christian experience. We are exhorted to count it all joy when we fall into divers temptations. It is not hard to count it joy when we come out of the temptations, but we are to count it so when we fall in. It is certainly not by feeling that we can count it joy, it must be by faith.
